SH opened the meeting.

1. Apologies and Order of the Agenda

Apologies were received and accepted from:

The order of the agenda was agreed.

2. Minutes of the Last Meeting held on 16 October 2018

The minutes of the meeting held on 16 October 2018 were agreed as an accurate record

3. Matters Arising

a. Quorum

Due to a number of apologies received for the meeting as well as a number of additional members who did not attend there was query as to whether the meeting was quorate. This has since been checked and the quorum is 9 (40%) – this is equal to the number of voting members who were in attendance.

b. Review of EHCP funding

POD reported that work is still underway with a view to implementing from 1st April 2019. Schools Forum requested data to demonstrate the potential financial impact for each school.

ACTION JF

4. 2018-19 DSG Budget Monitoring Setting 2019-20

JF introduced the report which set out the latest position on the DSG budget setting for 2019-20.

Schools Forum noted the overall response to the consultation undertaken by the LA in respect of three specific areas for decision for the 2019-20 DSG budget setting.

RMP queried whether the factor values will change for 2019-20. JF confirmed that they will remain the same with the exception of the 'lump sum' figure.

Minimum Funding Guarantee

Schools Forum noted the outcome of the consultation which had a 73% response in favour of setting an MFG of -1.5%.

JF explained that the DSG allocation to the LA will increase by 0.5% per pupil. However, as the local flexibility is to set the MFG between -1.5% and +0.5% per pupil the total increases may not be passed onto all schools depending on the impact of the NFF to each school.

IN queried what would happen if there was additional funding after MFG is applied. JF explained that this could be distributed across to all schools as a one off adjustment. It was agreed that this can be reviewed in January 2019 when the 2019-20 DSG settlement is known.

It was noted that at present the teachers' pay and pensions grant are excluded from the NFF.

Growth Fund

Schools Forum noted the indicative growth fund allocation and commitment. JF explained that it is projected that the allocation will be sufficient to cover the commitments in 2019-20. It was agreed that this can be reviewed in January 2019 when the 2019-20 DSG settlement is known.

High Needs Block – Transfer from Schools Block

A number of queries were raised in respect of the data provided in the report to demonstrate the increase in high needs spend and activity.

Schools Forum acknowledged that there had been a growth in numbers and spend since 2015. PG queried the growth in baseline budget between 2015-16 and 2018-19 to understand whether the growth in spend had been funded. JF explained whilst the budget had increased between years (figures not available in the meeting) the baseline starting point was already too low and the rate of growth has not kept up with the growth in numbers and spend.

In respect of the tribunal data JF confirmed that 'successful' referred to the outcome in relation to the LA and not the parent/family.

Schools Forum noted the outcome of the consultation which had a 77% response not in favour of transferring 0.5% of the Schools Block into the High Needs Block.

SH queried whether Schools Forum wanted to consider a vote to transfer 0.25% in 2019-20 to offer transitional protection. This was not agreed.

Schools Forum took a vote to decide whether to transfer 0.5% of the Schools Block into the High Needs Block in 2019-20.

No – 7 Yes – 1 Abstain – 1

Schools Forum did not agree to the transfer.

High Needs Block - overspend in 2018-19

Since the start of the financial year there has been a projected overspend on the High Needs Block. At its meeting in October Schools Forum considered a report which showed the projected DSG overspend at the end of 2018-19 to be £1.754m (High Needs Block overspend of £2.129m partially mitigated by an underspend in the growth fund of £0.375m). The LA has asked Schools Forum to consider using the uncommitted brought forward contingency of £2.663m to offset the projected deficit. Schools Forum discussed the use of the contingency to fund the deficit. It was acknowledged that a significant proportion had arisen as a result of underspends in early years and high needs in 2017-18.

Schools Forum took a vote on the options set out in the paper

Option 1 - 7Option 2 - 1Option 3 - 0Abstain - 1

Schools Forum agreed to Option 1, funding up to \pounds 1.754m projected net overspend from the contingency, with the unspent contingency of \pounds 0.909m to be applied to the school funding formula for 2019-20.

High Needs Block - Transfer of first two £6000s into Schools Block

Schools Forum noted the outcome of the consultation which had a 69% response rate in favour of not funding the place element of the first two EHCPs.

Any Other Business

Schools Forum requested that dates of future meetings be recirculated to members

Section 1 – summary

- Schools Forum at its meeting on 16 November 2018, considered a report setting out the outcome of the Harrow schools funding consultation 2019-20 and indicative budget setting intentions. This report was considered in advance of the notification of the 2019-20 Dedicated Schools Grant allocation. This was announced by the DfE on 17 December 2018.
- 2. This report outlines the latest 2019-20 settlement and details the proposed 2019-20 school budget to be submitted to the DfE by 20 January 2019.
- 3. Schools Forum is asked to:

 - Agree the final position on the Growth Fund at Table 2
 - Note the changes to Low Prior Attainment as set out at paragraphs 20-22

Section 2 – report

Dedicated Schools Grant 2019-20

- 4. The 2019-20 DSG is based on the number of pupils on the October 2018 school census. The total DSG for 2019-20 is £216.525m. This is subject to amendments to the allocations for the Early Years Block which will be updated to reflect the January 2019 Early Years Census data and recoupment of place funding for academies and post 16 providers in the High Needs Block.
- 5. Table 1 below shows the breakdown of the 2019-20 DSG across the four blocks. The sections following the table provide a detailed explanation for each funding block.

Schools Block

- 6. The schools block is funded on three different methodologies. Primary and secondary NFF units of funding cover core schools funding which includes:
 - Pupil-led factors basic per-pupil, deprivation, low prior attainment, English as an additional language, minimum per pupil funding, funding floor and transitional protections.
 - School-led factors lump sum, sparsity.
 - The area cost adjustment this is a multiplier that applies to both pupil-led and school-led factors.
- 7. The Primary and Secondary units of funding (PUF/SUF) have been calculated using the NFF and based on the 2018-19 pupil and school characteristics, including MFG but excluding mobility, business rates and growth fund items (covered later), and divided by the adjusted number of pupils on roll on the October 2018 school census.

- The allocation for 2019-20 is then based on the PUF/SUF multiplied by the NOR on the October 2018 school census. This has yielded per pupil funding of £156.146m.
- 9. In addition there is a Schools Block lump sum. This is funding for business rates and mobility and is based on the 2018-19 allocations totalling £3.509m.

Growth Fund

- 10. From 2019-20 growth funding is allocated to LAs using a new formulaic method based on lagged growth data.
- 11. Growth funding can only be used to:
 - Support growth in pre-16 pupil numbers to meet basic need
 - Support additional classes needed to meet the infant class size regulation
 - Meet the costs of new schools
- 12. Growth funding may not be used to support:
 - Schools in financial difficulty
 - General growth due to popularity; which is managed through lagged funding
- 13. Despite the change to the allocation of growth funding, LAs are not expected to change the method of allocating funding locally.
- 14. Harrow's current growth fund for primary expansions and bulge classes allocates £63k lump sum to each school in the September which expand/take a bulge class. This figure is approximately based on the 2017-18 primary school AWPU of £3,268 plus a small sum for resources & equipment, prorated for September to March when the pupils will be included in the following financial year's schools budget.
- 15. In the new funding formula the growth fund is based on pupil data from the October 2018 census. Funding is allocated to LAs based on the actual growth in pupil numbers in the previous year.
- 16. Growth is measured at middle layer super output area (MSOA) levels as these are small enough geographical areas to detect 'pockets' of growth within LAs. Growth is measured by counting the increase in pupil numbers in each MSOA between the two most recent October censuses. Only positive increases in pupil numbers will be included, so an LA with positive growth in one area and negative growth in another will not be denied growth funding.

17. Table 2 below shows the 2019-20 growth fund allocation based on changes between the October 2018 and 2017 census. In addition is a list of commitments against this funding for 2019-20.

18. Based on the above, the commitments against the growth fund in 2019-20 are affordable. However there is floor protection of £0.951m built into the funding formula. If this is removed in subsequent years then it could impact on the overall affordability. It may not be an issue as commitments in relation to the primary expansions start to drop out as the expansions move through the schools and growing schools have pupils in each year groups. However, if there is an issue the LA would have to look at either reducing the commitments or top slicing the schools block. This is a decision for future years.

Proposed Schools Funding Formula 2019-20

19. The NFF continues to be the method of distributing funding for 2019-20. The NFF factor values have remained the same as 2018-19 with the following exceptions:

Prior Attainment

- 20. The factor value for the primary low prior attainment has reduced (nationally) from £1,152.93 per pupil to £1,122.19. In the primary sector this applies to pupils identified as not achieving the expected level of development in the early years foundation stage profile (EYFSP).
- 21. The EYFSP changed in 2013 and since then the cohort measured in primary schools has increased year on year. This increase comes from changes to the assessment rather than changes to the underlying level of need. Therefore, the total proportion of spend on primary LPA through the NFF will

remain but in order to balance the increase in the eligible cohort, the factor value will reduce.

22. From the October 2018 census there are an additional 126 pupils in Harrow eligible for funding from this factor however as a result of the change in factor value there will be £68k less funding distributed through this factor.

Mobility

- 23. Funding for mobility is currently allocated to the Schools Block as a lump sum based on historic spend as the DfE has not yet identified an appropriate mechanism to allocate through the NFF.
- 24. In 2019-20 there is an additional 140 children eligible for this factor at an increased cost of £441k an increase of over 40%. It is possible to reduce the factor values to enable the same total level of funding to be distributed however this has significant implications to the MFG.
- 25. The impact would be that a number of schools would be at MFG where they previously wouldn't and there would be an increase to the cost of the MFG to the overall Schools Block of around £250k. Therefore the net increased cost of keeping the factor values the same as 2018-19 and funding the additional children is £191k which is affordable within the overall Schools Block.

Lump Sum

- 26. In 2018-19 the only exception to the NFF is that the lump sum has been increased by £12,000 being the place element of 2x £6,000 for pupils with EHCPs in mainstream schools.
- 27. The LA carried out a consultation in the Autumn Term 2018 which sought views on transferring this funding to the High Needs Block. However 69% (18) respondents did not agree to this transfer, instead agreeing that schools would not receive funding for the place element for the first two EHCPs.
- 28. At its meeting in November 2018 Schools Forum took a vote and 77% voted against agreeing the transfer.
- 29. This means that schools will no longer be funded for the first two £6,000s. This will be a real reduction of £12k to each school and will not be smoothed by the MFG as the MFG does not take into account changes to the lump sum.
- 30. The proposed Schools Funding Formula is shown at Table 3

Minimum Funding Guarantee

31. In 2019-20 the Minimum Funding Guarantee will continue to protect schools from per pupil losses between years. For the first time, in 2018-19, LAs were able to set an MFG between +0.5% and -1.5%. This is calculated on the

whole school unit but excluding business rates and the lump sum and then divided by the total number of pupils on roll.

- 32. In 2018-19 Schools Forum agreed to set the MFG at -1.5% in order that schools reach the NFF as soon as possible so as to ensure there won't be significant losses if the MFG protection is no longer applied.
- 33. In the consultation with all schools in Autumn Term 2018 the LA sought views on the value of the MFG for 2019-20. 73% (19) of respondents support a MFG of -1.5% and those in favour of -1.5% expressed a need to get all schools as near to the NFF funding formula as possible.
- 34. Therefore the schools budgets will be prepared using -1.5% MFG in the funding formula for 2019-20. It is not planned to cap gains in the formula. Both of these approaches are consistent with 2018-19.
- 35. In 2018-19 there are 14 schools protected at MFG. In the proposed 2019-20 funding formula there will be 16 schools protected at MFG and no school will be capped on gains.
- 36. The MFG changes are as follows:
 - 5 primary schools cease being protected at MFG because they all benefit from changes to the LPA criteria (despite reduction in factor value) and in addition 2 schools become newly eligible for mobility funding
 - 7 primary schools will be newly protected at MFG because they all lose out by changes to the LPA criteria and the reduction in the factor value. In addition a number of schools have reduced eligibility for EAL and in some cases mobility, FSM and IDACI
 - 7 primary and 2 secondary schools will remain protected at MFG

Indicative School Budgets 2019-20

- 37. Indicative Individual School Budgets for 2019-20 are shown at Appendix A which includes a crude analysis of the changes between years. Note, these are the budgets derived through the formula and do not include funding for early years nurseries, EHCPs, SEN units, Pupil Premium, Universal Infant Free School Meals or Devolved Formula Capital.
- 38. These budgets are indicative and subject to Harrow Cabinet ratification and DfE approval of the school funding formula in February 2019.

Additional funding

39. In 2018-19 in the calculation used by the DfE to set Primary and Secondary units of funding, the October 2016 census figures were adjusted to take account of opening and closing schools. The pupil count was adjusted to

reflect the closing of Avanti House All Through school from September 2017 but was not adjusted to reflect the subsequent opening of Avanti House Primary and Secondary schools. Therefore the pupil numbers were reduced below those in the actual census. This meant that in order to determine the units of funding for 2018-19, the total requirement for 2017-18 (which included the full Avanti House budget) was divided by the pupil numbers (which did not include all of the Avanti House pupils), thus increasing the per pupil amounts. This generated an additional £3m in funding.

- 40. This was treated as a one off adjustment since there has been no opening or closing schools in 2018-19 and therefore the PUF/SUFs have been rebased.
- 41. On 7th December 2018 the ESFA wrote to the LA to confirm that the allocation in 2018-19 had been an error which will subsequently be rectified for 2019-20. However a number of LAs which had also been in the same position had not realised that they had been overfunded in error in 2018-19 and therefore had been planning for a similar level of funding for 2019-20. As a result of this and to acknowledge that this had been an ESFA error, the ESFA has agreed to honour this additional funding for one more year in 2019-20. This equates to £2.9m for Harrow.

Schools Block Allocation and Commitments

42. Table 4 shows the 2019-20 schools block allocation and commitments as set out at the above paragraphs.

43. A summary of the assumptions in these figures is as follows:

- NFF continues to be method of distribution
- Lump sum does not include first 2x £6,000s for place funding
- MFG set at -1.5%, growth on gains not capped
- Growth Fund committed as per Table 2
- Transfer from the schools block to the high needs block 0.5% not agreed

44. There is in total £5.5m uncommitted compared with the Schools Block allocation. The breakdown of this is shown in Table 5.

45. In 2018-19 and 2019-20 the aggregate of all the Schools Block funding to the LA includes an uplift of +0.5%. However in 2018-19 the MFG locally was set at -1.5%. As the MFG is proposed to be set at -1.5% again in 2019-20 there is capacity within the overall Schools Block. The Government has only committed to funding +0.5% up to 2019-20 and there are no announcements beyond that date, including whether there will be any MFG at all. The MFG capacity for 2019-20 is broken down at Table 6.

46. The options for distributing this funding through the formula are as follows:

- Increase the MFG above -1.5% (to a maximum of +0.5%)
- Increase the AWPU amount and distribute the funding as a technical adjustment so that it does not impact on MFG
- 47. By increasing the MFG above -1.5% this only benefits those schools which are currently protected at MFG or set to lose any funding through the formula. For example if a school is set to lose -5% through the NFF it will currently be protected by -3.5% in order that it doesn't lose more than -1.5%. If the MFG is increased to say +0.5% then that school will be given funding to the value of +5.5% to get it from its current 'loss' position up to a positive position. If a school is already set to receive +0.5% (or more) through the NFF it will not receive any additional benefit by increasing the MFG.
- 48. By increasing the AWPU amount all schools will see additional funding in 2019-20 regardless of their NFF or MFG position. It will also be easier for

schools to identify what their true NFF budget will be albeit including protection of -1.5% MFG for relevant schools.

49. It is therefore proposed to allocate all of this funding, both one off and ongoing, to schools through the AWPU but as a one off adjustment so that each school will see a benefit. This will be considered a one off adjustment and any impact it may have on artificially increasing MFG baselines for future years will be adjusted the following year. The potential additional funding is shown at Appendix B. These budgets are indicative and subject to Harrow Cabinet ratification and DfE approval of the school funding formula in February 2019.

High Needs Block

50. Table 7 shows the provisional High Needs Block allocation for 2019-20. This will be updated in year to reflect the revised import/export adjustments.

- 52. Funding for RNOH School was increased from October 2017 to reflect the expansion of the school. This additional funding is the full year effect of this and is committed to hospital education.
- 53. Changes in demographics and Additional Pupil numbers reflect the variable element of the HNB allocation which is based on actual pupil data. There has been an increase in eligibility for KS2 low attainment as well as some small increases for IDACI, disability and Bad Health. There are an additional 15 children recorded as attending special schools and academies.
- 54. The Funding Floor ensures local authorities do not fall below a minimum level of funding. The factor is applied to the funding calculated through historic spend factor and proxy factors. There are two elements:
 - a per head floor ensuring relevant elements of the funding increase on a per head basis from the 2017 to 2018 baseline year by at least 1% in 2019 to 2020, based on the ONS estimated population of 2-18 year olds
 - an absolute floor ensuring funding does not drop below the 2017 to 2018 baseline. This prevents local authorities with a shrinking population receiving an allocation of less than their 2017 to 2018 baseline.
- 55. HNB growth refers to the additional funding announced by the Government in December 2018. The total for Harrow is £1.213m spread over two financial years 2018-19 and 2019-20. There are no further announcements about whether this funding will continue beyond these years.
- 56. The additional SEN Funding is welcomed although the uncertainty about funding for future years is not helpful. In addition the allocation is arbitrary and does not reflect what is happening in reality. The pressure on the High Needs Block in 2018-19 is £2.1m and this is projected to continue and to grow as growth in demand continues and the LA becomes even more reliant on expensive out of borough provision. Whilst there are plans in place to increase in-borough provision this takes time.
- 57. In the consultation with all schools in Autumn Term 2018 the LA sought views on whether schools would consider agreeing to top-slice the schools block by 0.5% (£829k) and transfer to the HNB to help mitigate some of the pressures.
- 58. In the response 77% (20) did not support a transfer from the Schools Block into the High Needs Block. The main reason stated for not agreeing the transfer were concerns about the working group and the review of spending across all areas of HNB and that any overspend should be shown as a deficit so the underfunding of the HNB is visible at both local and national level.

59. Given the overall capacity within the Schools Block in 2019-20 after implementing the NFF the LA is requesting Schools Forum to reconsider its decision to not agree the transfer of 0.5% of the Schools Block into the HNB in 2019-20.

Early Years Block

- 60. The government introduced a new National Funding Formula for Early Years from April 2017.
- 61. In 2019-20 the hourly rate per part time pupil on the January Early Years census that the Local Authority (LA) receives will be the same as in 2018-19.
- 62. The key points on LA funding of providers are that local authorities:
 - Continue to set a single funding rate for both entitlements for three and four year olds (that is, both the universal 15 hours and the additional 15 hours for working parents).
 - Must plan to spend at least 95% of the three and four year old funding on the delivery of the entitlements for three and four year olds. We intend to continue to pass on 95% of the 3 and 4 year old funding to settings.
 - May request that 95% requirement be dis-applied in specific, exceptional circumstances. We are not in a position to do this.
 - Harrow provides a universal base rate for all types of provider in the formula.
 - Must use a deprivation supplement in the funding formula, and any other supplements must fall within one of the allowable categories. The supplements we have chosen remain the same.
 - Must not channel more than 10% of funding through funding supplements.
 - Must provide a SEN Inclusion Fund (SENIF) for three and four year olds.
 - Must pass on Early Years Pupil Premium (EYPP) in full to providers for eligible three and four year olds.
 - Must pass on Disability Access Fund (DAF) funding in full to providers for eligible three and four year olds.

63. Harrow has already implemented all of the above principles in its EYSFF.

- 64. At the time of writing a short consultation is underway which seeks views on the quality supplement and the creation of a new central fund to support system leadership and workforce development.
- 65. The results of the consultation will be reported to Cabinet in February 2019 and to Schools Forum in March 2019.

Other School Budgets

Capital

66. The DfE have yet to confirm the 2019-20 capital allocation. This is expected later in January and any Devolved Formula Capital will be included in the final school budgets.

Pupil Premium

67. Schools will continue to receive the Pupil Premium. Eligibility and funding rates are shown at Table 9.

70. There have been no announcements in respect of these beyond the 2018-19 academic year
