MAIN LANGUAGE AND PROFICIENCY IN ENGLISH 2011 CENSUS SECOND RELEASE

The 2011 Census was taken on 27th March 2011 and outputs from the Census are being released in phases by the Office for National Statistics (ONS). The latest set of Key and Quick Statistics were released on 30th January 2013 and this paper reports largely on outputs from this release covering Main Language and Proficiency in English.

The 2011 Census was the first UK Census to include a question on language. The question asked “What is your main language?” and respondents were asked to tick English or write in another language (including British Sign Language).

The question focused on main language spoken, rather than asking what languages people speak. Therefore the actual numbers of speakers of the languages detailed in this paper will almost certainly be much higher for most of the languages. There is no information at present which correlates main language with other factors such as ethnicity, country of birth, age, length of time in the country or employment rates. However, the likelihood of speaking English as a main language is closely associated with ethnicity and also with country of birth for a number of groups. Further reports will examine some of these relationships.

A follow-up question was asked of those people whose main language was not English. This question asked “How well can you speak English?” Residents had the choice of four boxes to tick in response to this question - Very well, Well, Not well and Not at all.

The results of these two questions were analysed for all people aged three and over, accounting for 229,398 residents, so all percentages are based on this figure and not Harrow’s total population of 239,056. At present, there is no information which cross-tabulates a persons main language and their command of spoken English.

The findings in this paper are based on the results of 2011 Census Tables QS204EW (Main Language), KS206EW (Household Language) and QS205 (Proficiency in English).

Rankings are based on all 348 London Boroughs, unitary authorities and districts in England and Wales. London rankings are based on all 33 London Boroughs, including the City of London. National figures are based on England & Wales.

Summary

- At least 88 different languages are ‘spoken’ in Harrow, including three categories of sign language. Not all languages have been specifically identified by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) in their reporting on this question. For example, only twelve different African languages have been specified, with the rest being summarised under three general headings. In reality there are over 2,000 different languages spoken in Africa.
- English is the main language spoken amongst Harrow’s residents, with 71.5 per cent (164,051) of residents, below London’s level of 77.9 per cent and the national (England and Wales) level of 92.3 per cent
- Harrow is ranked 9th lowest nationally, based on the percentage of residents whose main language is English
- 28.5 per cent (65,347) of Harrow’s residents have a foreign first language
- Harrow’s second most commonly spoken language is Gujarati, with 20,368 speakers, 8.9 per cent of residents. Nationally Polish is the second most widely spoken language (in Wales Polish comes second to English or Welsh as the most widely spoken language).
- Tamil is Harrow’s third most prolifically spoken language, with 8,304 speakers or 3.6 per cent of residents. Nationally Panjabi is the third most widely spoken language.
- Harrow is ranked 8th nationally for linguistic diversity in the Greater London Authority’s Linguistic Diversity Index (based on Simpson’s Diversity Index Methodology)
- Just under 1 per cent (2,025) of all Harrow’s residents (aged three and over) cannot speak English at all. This is higher than London’s level of 0.6 per cent and the national level of 0.3 per cent.
- A further 9,900 (4.3%) of all residents said that they do not speak English well. Again this level is higher than both London’s overall level of 3.5 per cent and the national level of 0.3 per cent.
- In 15.9 per cent (13,415) of households English is not the main language of any household occupants, the 10th highest ranking nationally and much higher than the national level of 4.3 per cent

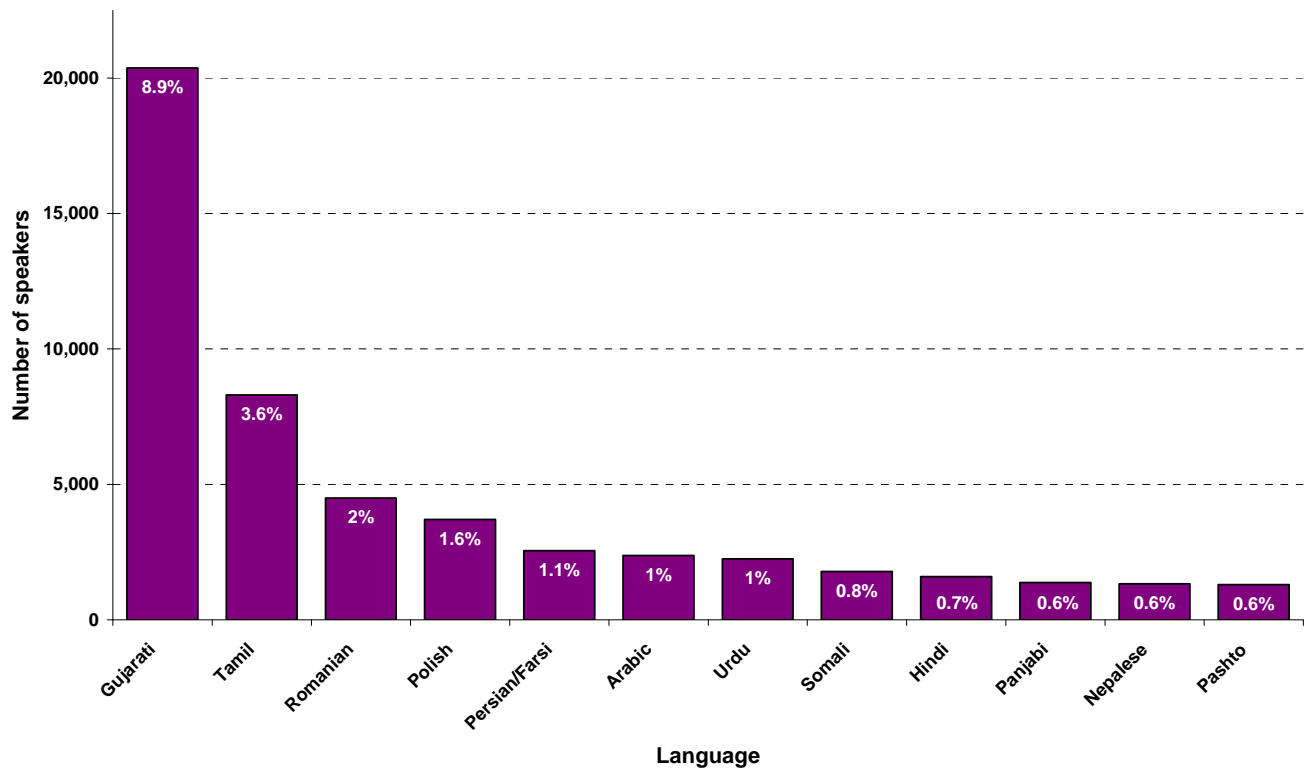
Main Languages Spoken in Harrow

Figure 1 shows the top twelve foreign languages spoken in Harrow as a main language. Whilst over 65,300 people do not use English as their main language, this does not mean that all these people are unable to speak English.

Appendix A gives the full list of the main languages spoken by Harrow’s residents and Appendix B shows the main twelve foreign languages spoken (including English), by ward. A ward and Lower Super Output Area (LSOA) map can be found in Appendix C.

- With over 20,300 (8.9%) residents speaking Gujarati as their main language, this is the most commonly spoken foreign language in Harrow and ranks Harrow 2nd nationally (after Leicester) and 1st in London. 9.6 per cent of the country's Gujarati speakers (as a main language) live in Harrow. Nationally Gujarati is the 5th main foreign language after Polish, Panjabi, Urdu and Bengali.
- Tamil is Harrow's 2nd main foreign language with over 8,300 (3.6%) residents speaking this language as their main language. Harrow is ranked 1st nationally for Tamil speakers and in total 8.2 per cent of Tamil speakers live in the borough. The top ten areas for Tamil speakers are all London Boroughs.
- Nearly 4,500 (2%) of Harrow's residents speak Romanian as their main language. Harrow is ranked 1st nationally for Romanian speakers, with 6.6 per cent of the country's Romanian speakers.

- Polish is Harrow's 4th most widely spoken foreign language with 3,700 speakers. Despite being widely spoken in the borough, Harrow's ranking nationally for Polish speakers is 52nd.
- Farsi/Persian, Arabic and Urdu are also widely spoken languages in Harrow, with around 2,300 to 2,500 speakers of each language (as a primary language)

Table 1 shows foreign languages, spoken as a main language, where Harrow is ranked in the top twenty local authorities nationally. Some of the highest rankings are for South Asian languages, but these do not include some of the more widely spoken languages nationally, such as Panjabi, Urdu and Bengali. The table also highlights the fact that Harrow has relatively high numbers of residents who use sign language, both British Sign Language and others. Harrow is also ranked in the top ten nationally for languages originating from West/Central Asia, such as Farsi/Persian and Pashto, but also Arabic, which is widely spoken in many parts of Africa, Asia and Europe.

Linguistic Diversity Index

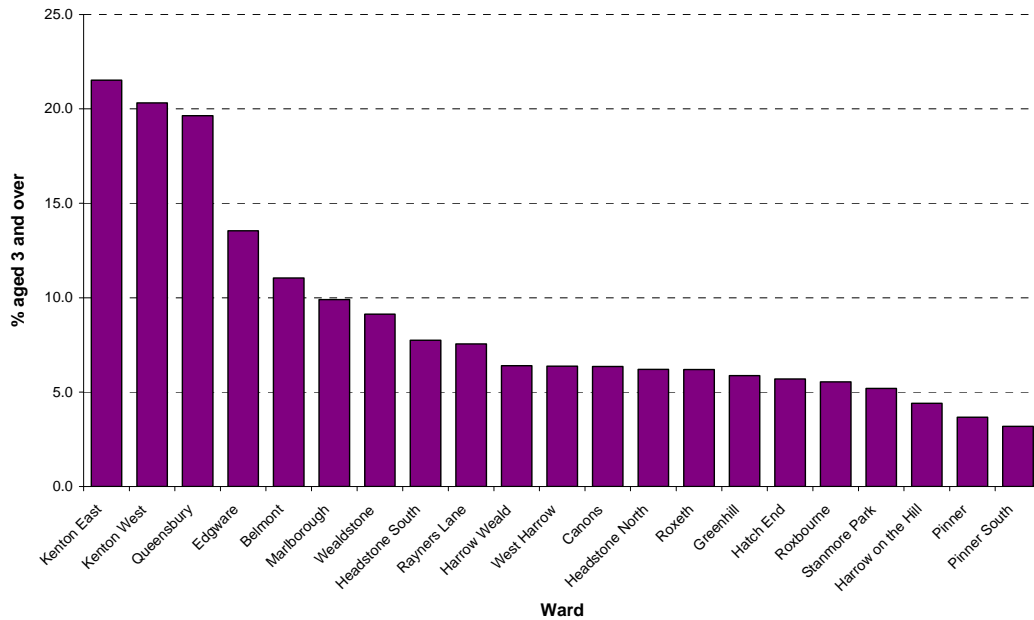
The Greater London Authority's Linguistic Diversity Index (based on Simpson's Diversity Index methodology) ranks Harrow 8th nationally for linguistic diversity. The top nine most linguistically diverse local authorities in England & Wales are all London Boroughs. The most diverse borough is Newham followed by Brent, Ealing, Tower Hamlets, Westminster, Haringey, Hounslow, then Harrow.

Ward Level Distribution

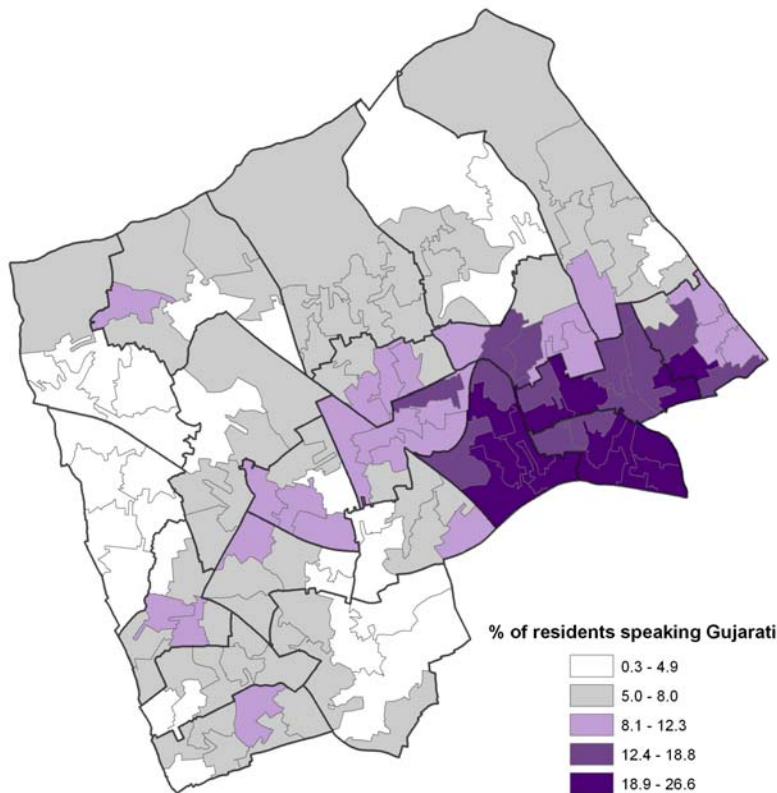
Figures 2 to 6 show the ward distribution of residents whose main language is: Gujarati; Tamil; Romanian; Polish; or Farsi/Persian. Maps 1 to 5 show the data at Lower Super Output (LSOA) level. These are the top five foreign languages spoken in Harrow.

Gujarati Speakers

Map 1: Residents whose Main Language is Gujarati



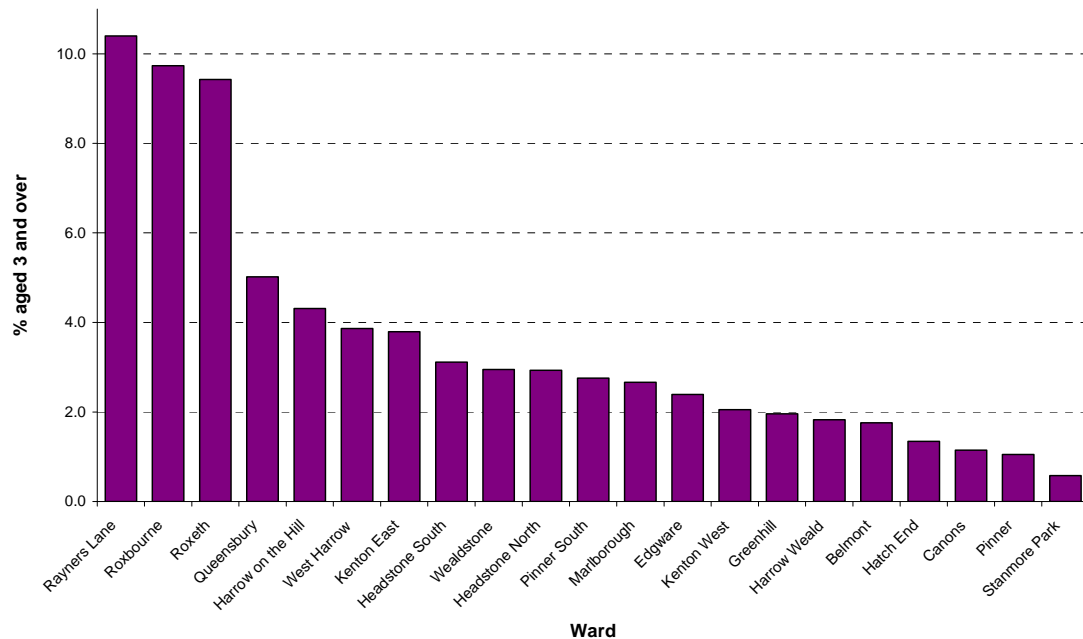
Gujarati speakers predominate in the wards to the east of Harrow. Around 20 per cent of residents in Kenton West, Kenton East and Queensbury wards speak largely Gujarati (Figure 2).

The two Pinner wards have the lowest number of Gujarati speakers, but the numbers are still greater than 300 or 3 per cent of the resident population.

Tamil Speakers

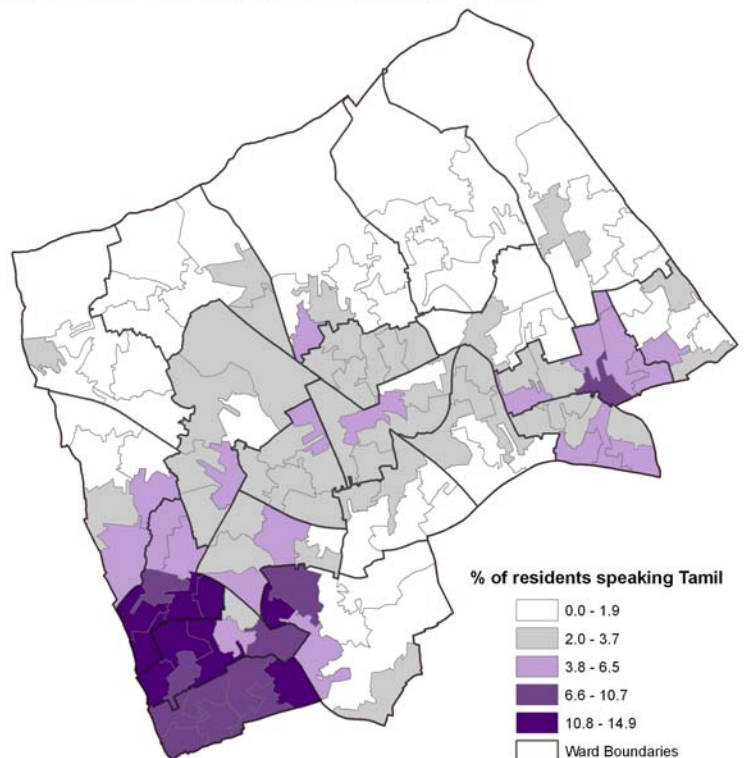
Figure 3: Tamil speakers (as a main language), by ward

Harrow's second largest non-English speaking group of residents are Tamil speakers. The highest numbers of Tamil speakers (as a main language) live in the wards in the south-east of Harrow - Rayners Lane, Roxbourne and Roxeth. Around 9.5 per cent of residents are Tamil speakers in each of these wards (Figure 3).

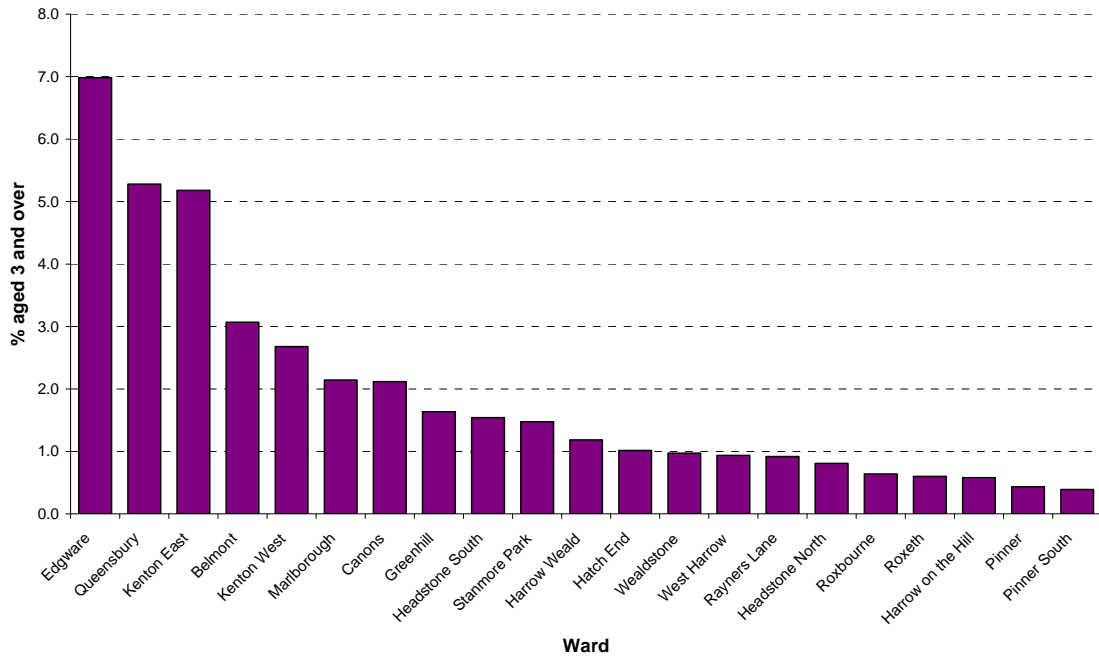
The wards to the north of the borough generally have lower number of residents whose main language is Tamil, with Stanmore Park having the fewest, at 0.6 per cent (63 people).

Romanian Speakers

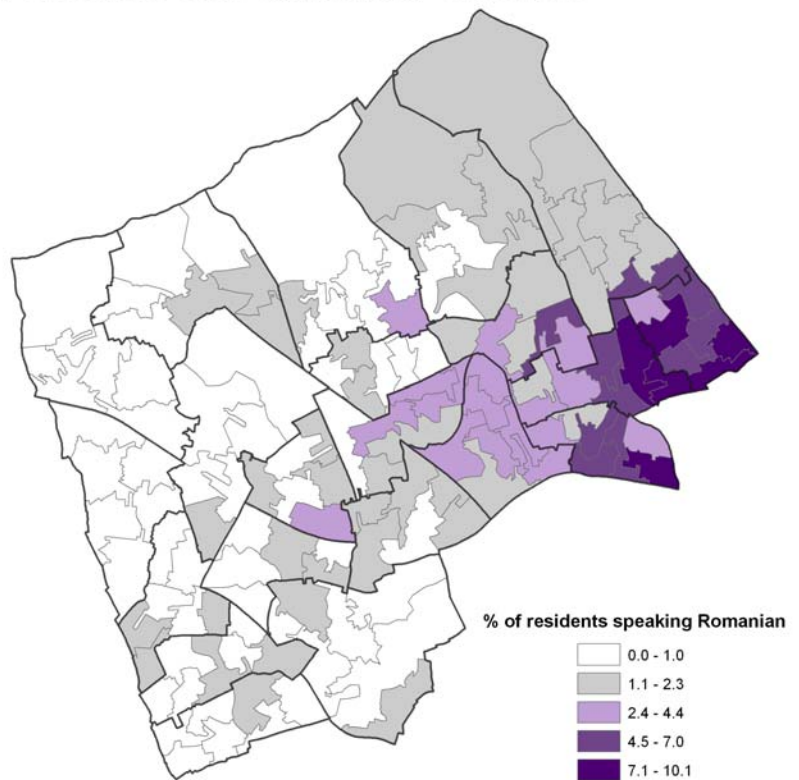
Figure 4: Romanian speakers (as a main language), by ward



Harrow's Romanian speakers are also largely concentrated in the wards to the east of the borough. Edgware ward has the highest numbers, with nearly 800 Romanian speakers, 7% of the ward's population (aged three and over). In Queensbury and Kenton East wards over 5% of residents speak Romanian as their main language (Figure 4).

The wards to the west of the borough have the fewest number of Romanian speakers, with fewer than 100 (1%) of residents speaking Romanian in eight of Harrow's wards.

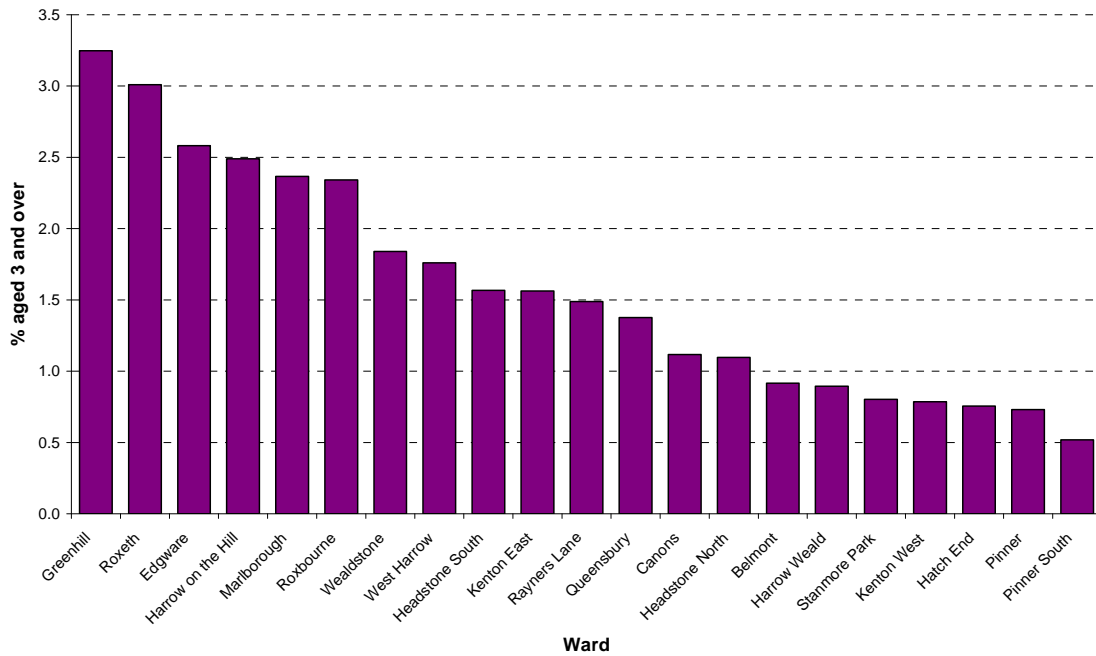
Map 3: Residents whose Main Language is Romanian



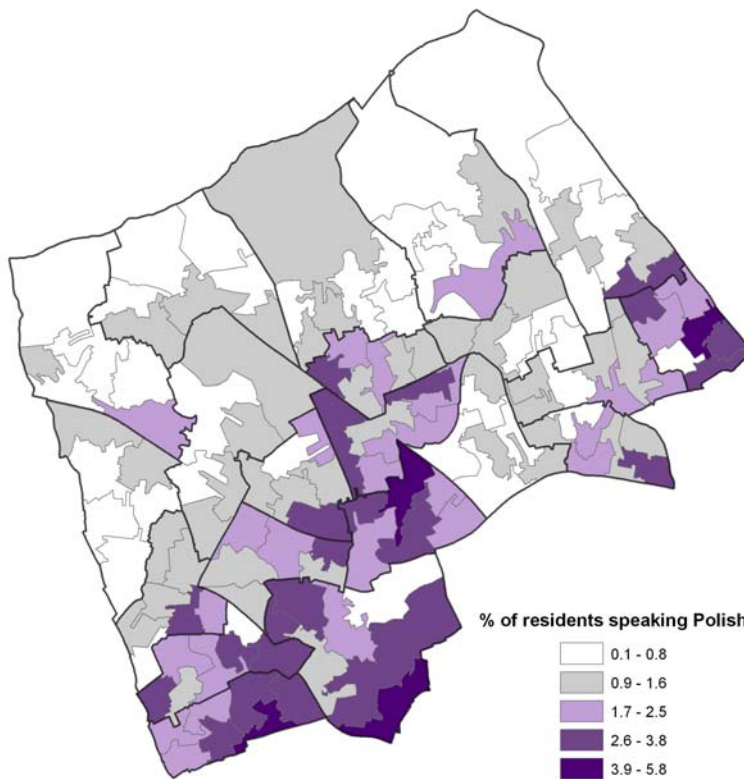

Polish Speakers

Map 4: Residents whose Main Language is Polish



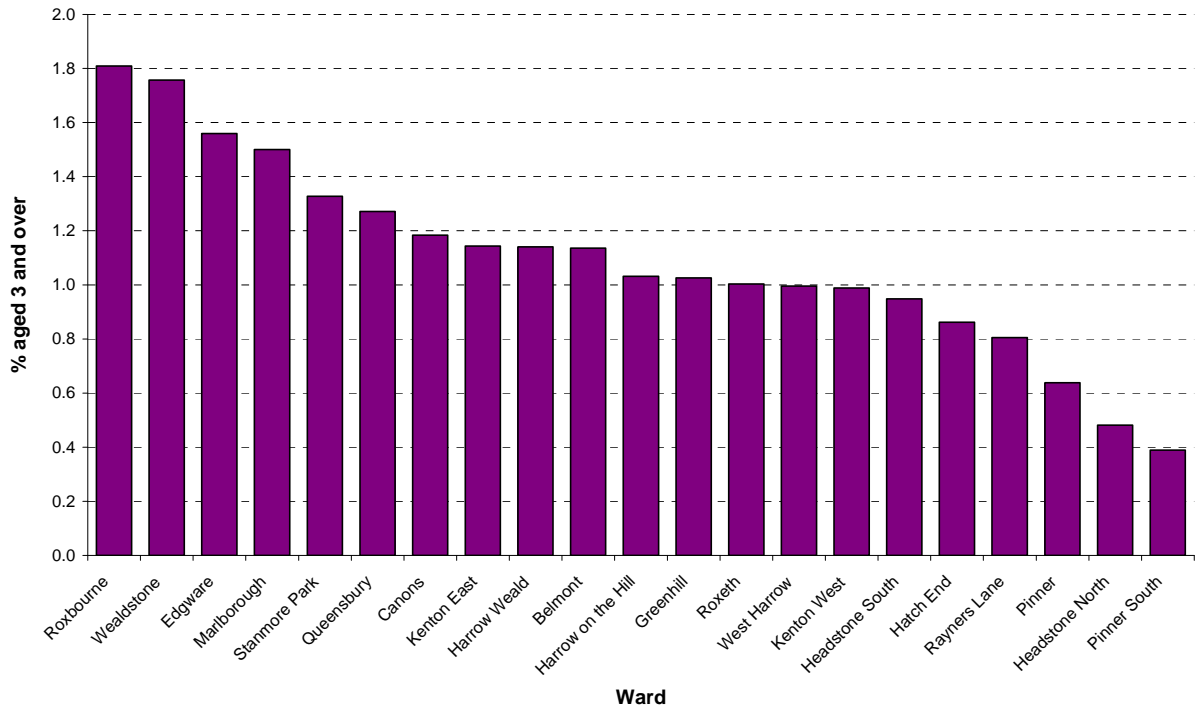
There is not such a defined pattern in the distribution of Polish speaking residents. The highest numbers (over 300 people) live in Greenhill and Roxeth wards, but over 200 Polish speakers live in Edgware, Harrow on the Hill, Marlborough and Roxbourne wards (Figure 5).

The lowest numbers live in the three wards in the north-west of Harrow - Pinner South, Pinner and Hatch End wards.

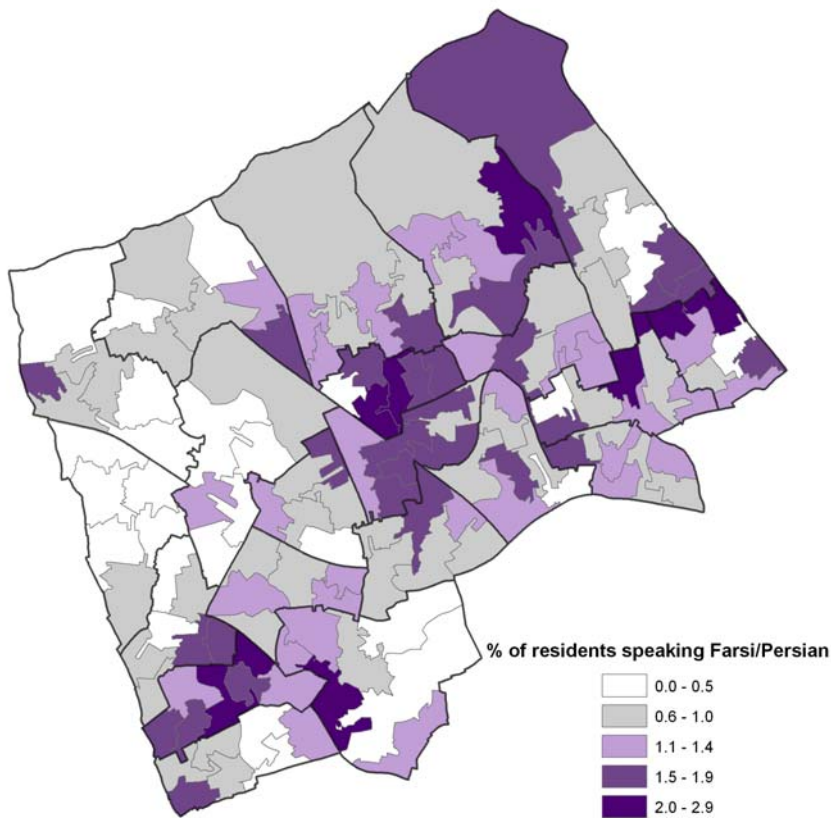

Harrow has over 2,500 residents whose main language is Farsi/Persian. Higher numbers live in Roxbourne, Wealdstone, Edgware and Marlborough wards and lower numbers in Harrow's wards in the north-west of the borough - Pinner South, Headstone North and Pinner wards (Figure 6).

Proficiency in English

This was a new topic in the 2011 Census, but the question was only asked of the people who said that their main language wasn't English.

- 2,025 residents (just under 1% of all Harrow's residents aged three and over) cannot speak English at all. This is higher than London's level of 0.6 per cent and the national level of 0.3 per cent. In the national rankings, Harrow is ranked 151st, but 8th in London (Table 2).
- A further 9,900 (4.3%) of all Harrow's residents said that they do not speak English well. Again this level is higher than both London's overall level of 3.5 per cent and the national level of 0.3 per cent. In the national rankings, Harrow is ranked 183rd, but 13th in London.

Proficiency in English

Proficiency in English (English or Welsh in Wales) language classifies people whose main language is not English (English or Welsh in Wales) according to their level of ability to speak English - whether they can speak English very well, or well, or whether they cannot speak English well, or at all.

Note: The published rankings for this table are based on all usual residents, but the rankings shown in the above table for levels of proficiency in English are based on all usual residents (aged 3+) whose main language is not English

Ward Distribution

- Kenton East ward has the highest percentage of residents who cannot speak English, at 1.8 per cent (193 residents), followed by Marlborough (1.4%), Queensbury (1.4%), Edgware (1.4%) and Kenton West (1.3%) wards (Figure 7, Table 3 and Map 6)
- Similarly, Kenton East, Edgware and Queensbury wards all have the highest number and percentage of residents who cannot speak English well, with over 800 (7.2% - 8.4%) residents in each ward
- There are three distinct areas in the borough where there are relatively high numbers of residents who either do not speak English or do not speak English well (Map 6). These areas are: in the south-east of the borough, clustered around Kenton East, Queensbury and Edgware ward; in Marlborough and Wealdstone wards; in a third cluster in South Harrow, straddling Roxeth and Harrow on the Hill wards.
- The wards in the north-west of Harrow (Pinner South, Pinner and Headstone North) have the lowest numbers of people who either cannot speak English or do not speak English well. Only 19 (0.2%) residents in Pinner South ward cannot speak English.

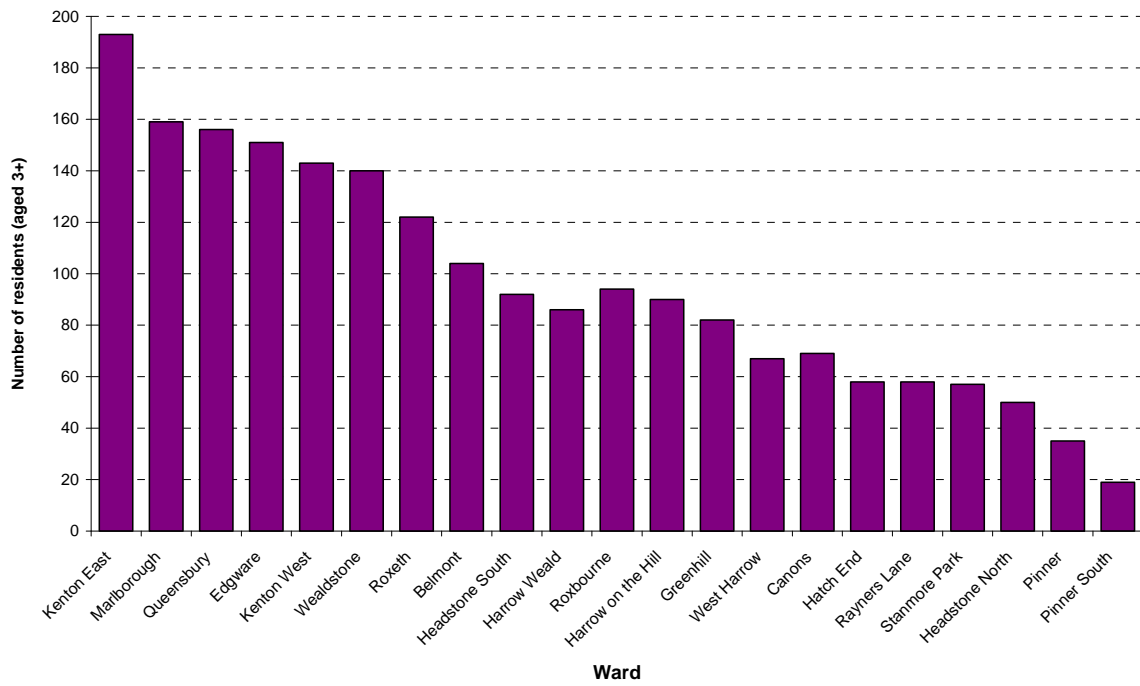

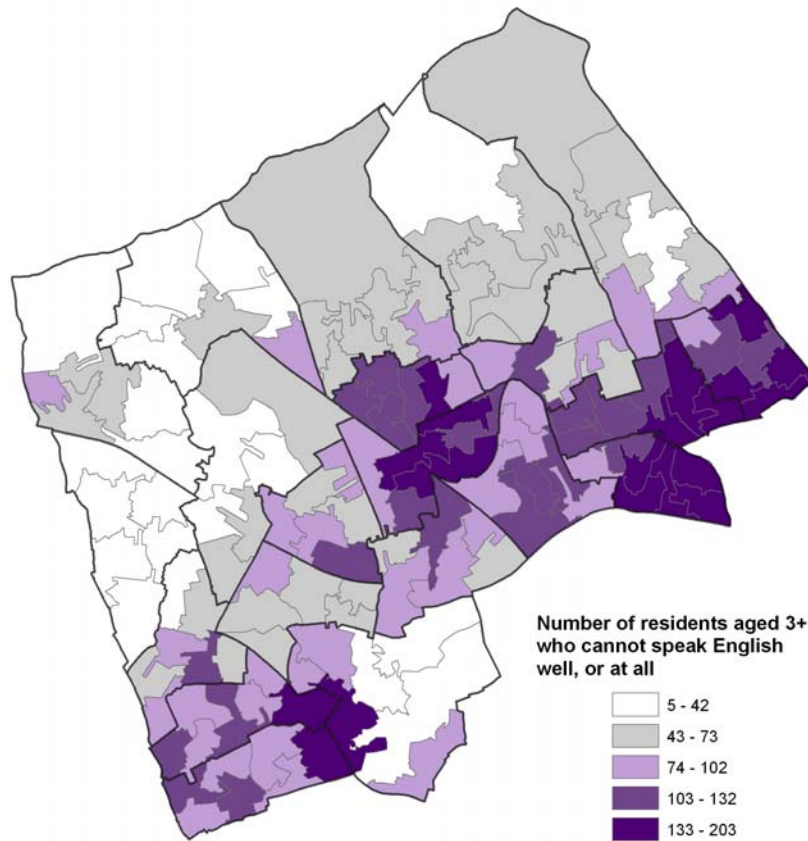

Household Language

From the question asked of all people on main language spoken at home, the ONS has combined this information to give information on household language. The results not only show the number of households where English is not used as a main language, but also those households where no adults use English as a main language, but where children (aged 3 to 16) do.

- In a high percentage of Harrow's households English is not the main language (Table 4)
- English is spoken as a main language by all people aged 16 and over in 67 per cent of Harrow's households - the 9th lowest ranking nationally and considerably lower than the national average of 91.2 per cent
- In 13.5 per cent (11,380) of Harrow's households at least one person, but not all (aged 16+), speaks English as a main language. This percentage is the 7th highest ranking nationally.
- In 3.6 per cent (3,030) of households no adults use English as their main language, but English is the main language of at least one-person aged 3 to 15, the 7th highest ranking nationally
- In 15.9 per cent (13,415) of households English is not the main language of any household occupants, the 10th highest ranking nationally and much higher than the national level of 4.3 per cent

Household language

Household language classifies households by the combination of adults and children within a household that have English (English, or Welsh in Wales) as a main language. Household language uses the alternate definition of an adult and child that are used in a small number of census results.

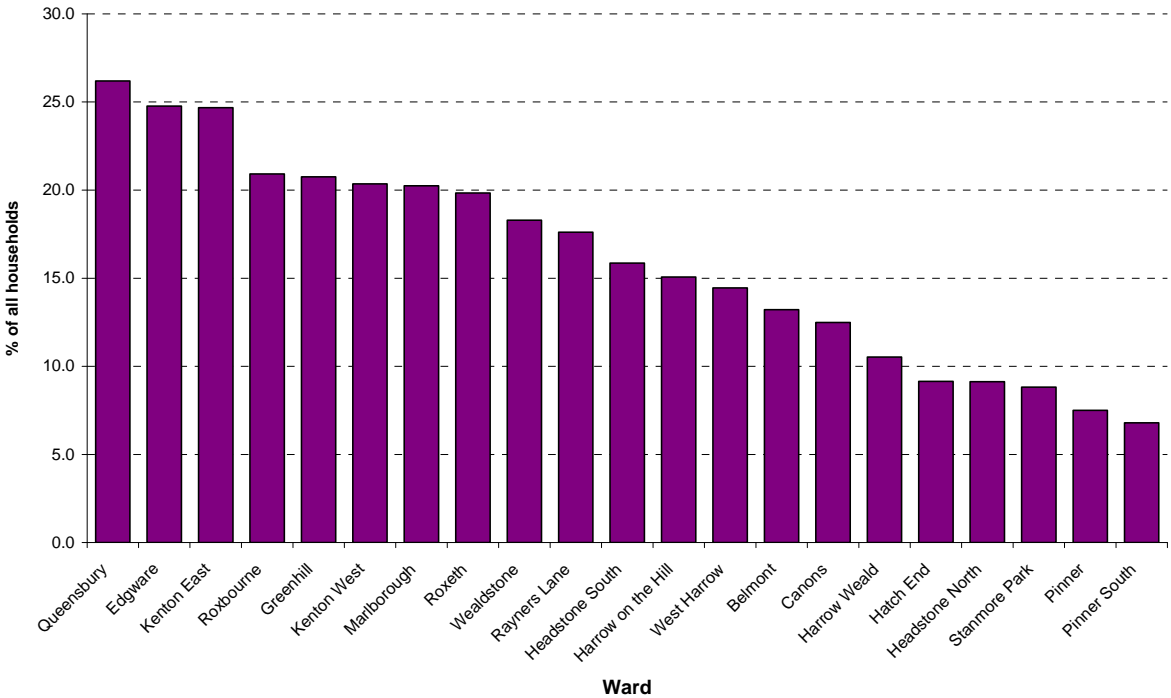
Main language

The language that is a person's first or preferred language.

Ward Distribution

- In seven of Harrow's wards over 20 per cent of all households (all members) do not use English as their main language. These wards are generally to the east and south of the borough, with Queensbury (26.2%), Edgware (24.8%) and Kenton East (24.7%) having the highest percentages. These are the top three wards where Romanian is most widely spoken as a main language and also where Gujarati is widely spoken too (Figure 8).
- In the wards of Pinner South, Pinner, Stanmore Park, Headstone North and Hatch End the percentage of households where all household members speak a foreign language as their main language is much lower, at under 10 per cent

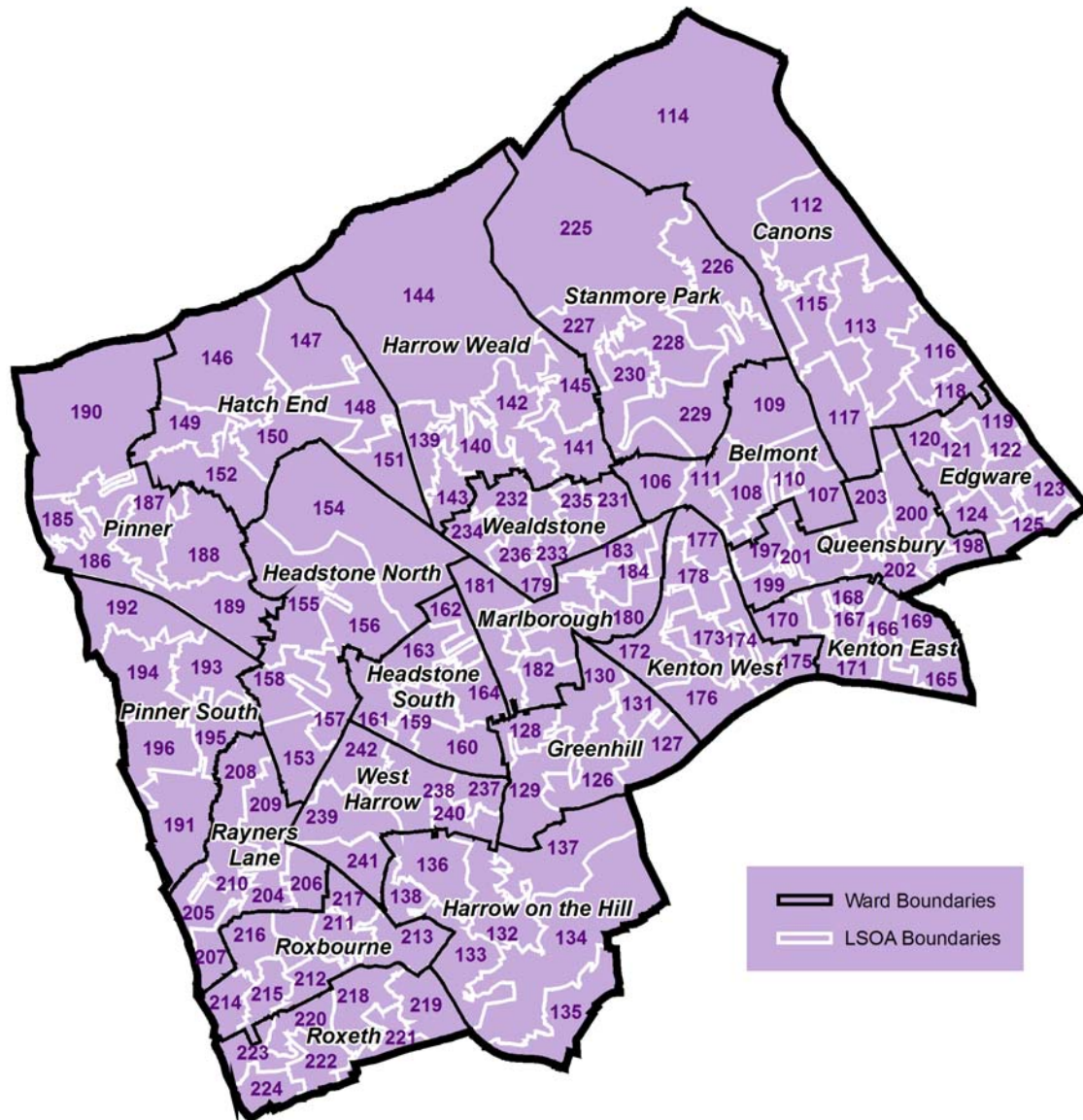
