Mr Arora is the Company Director of Good Morning Superstore Ltd. We believe the business is failing to promote two of the licensing objectives, namely the prevention of crime and disorder and public safety.

The business's current licensable activity is the sale of retail alcohol.

On 16th April 2015, as part of a routine inspection, Trading Standards officers and Her Majesty Revenue and Customs (HMRC) visited Good Morning Superstore Ltd at 262 Streatfield Road, Harrow, HA3 9BY. Whilst there the HMRC officers seized 564 litres of beer, 270 litres of wine and 13.7 litres of spirits, which the business could not prove they have paid any duty on. The Trading Standards officers confiscated tobacco products which consisted of 33 packets of cigarettes, 5 packets of smoking tobacco and 104 packets of chewing tobacco which did not display the correct statutory health warnings on them as required by the Tobacco Products (Manufacture, Presentation, and Sale) (Safety) Regulations 2002. These Regulations make it an offence for tobacco products to not have the health warnings in the correct format and this wording must be in English. All these products were in possession for sale to members of the public. None of the tobacco products seized had English labelling on them and were therefore not made for the UK market. We therefore believe due to the quantity of items found that these products have been smuggled illegally into the country to be sold on in UK shops. (See attached documents 1 & 2)

Mr Arora was interviewed under caution on the 11th May 2016 and stated that he purchased the products from a man who came into his shop selling these products and had no contact details for him. Mr Arora stated that three months prior to this, he had purchased the alcohol seized by HMRC from a different man. He also admitted he had the tobacco products as he knew it was wrong to sell them.

London Borough of Harrow Trading Standards Service, laid two informations at Willesden Magistrates Court with regards to the illicit tobacco seized from the company. One of the charges was for 38 smoking tobacco products and the other charge was for 104 chewing tobacco products failing to comply with the above Regulations. These charges were heard on the 3/11/15. Mr Arora, pleaded guilty on behalf of the company to these charges. The company was fined £200 and ordered to pay fines of £1021. (See attached documents 3)

On 24th February 2016, another joint inspection was carried out, with Trading Standards and HMRC officers at . Officers found a further 2386 litres of various brand/strength beer which the business could not prove they paid duty on. [REDACTED], Fraud investigation Officer for HMRC, seized the alcohol as Mr Arora failed to give him any proof that duty had been paid on the alcohol. [REDACTED] has stated in his statement that the loss of revenue for the seized goods amounts to £2,654.42 Excise Duty, plus £817.26 VAT. (See attached document 4)

Good Morning Superstore Limited was also in possession of tobacco products, namely 13 packets of cigarettes, 12 pouches of chewing tobacco which failed to display the correct statutory health warnings on them as the labelling was not in English. Trading Standards Officers have supplied statements, detailing the seizures and including photographs of the tobacco products. The illicit alcohol and tobacco were seized and removed from the premises by the officers. Once again none of the tobacco products seized had English labelling on them and were therefore not made for the UK market. We therefore believe that these products have been smuggled illegally into the country to be sold on in UK shops. (See attached document 5)

Mr Arora was interviewed under caution on 31/3/16 and gave a no comment interview to all questions including where he had obtained the products from. This Service wishes to remind the panel that they should draw their own inferences from this 'No Comment' interview.

Companies House records also show that they wrote to the company on the 5/7/16 given them notice that the company will be struck off the register and the company dissolved, two months from the 5/7/16. This is because it has failed to file any accounts with them. (See attached document 6).

It is in my professional opinion, the smuggled alcohol and tobacco products were in possession for sale and therefore this matter should be treated particularly seriously as per the guidance in paragraph 11.27 of the Home Office publication 'Amended Guidance Issued Under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003'.

Mr Arora the company director, holds a personal licence as he is the designated premise supervisor number Hounslow H03056. Good Morning Superstore Limited is very much aware of the law and has been prosecuted before.

The products were not labelled in English and therefore not made for the UK market. Tobacco products are highly regulated as to the amount of harmful chemicals in the products. This amount varies from country to country, and therefore undermines the public safety objective.

This Service is of the opinion that the appropriate and proportionate response to this continued flouting of the laws is revocation of the licence.

We introduced ourselves to her by showing of our warrant cards and explaining the reasons and nature of our visit to the shop. Ms

20 explained that she was just a worker and that the owner was on his way in. We then began our inspection of the premises. One of the HMRC officer's went behind the counter to inspect the cigarettes when he came across couple of plastic carrier bags and placed them on the counter and asked me to look inside the bag, which I did. In the bags were a quantity of cigarettes and various types of other tobacco products such as rolling and
25 chewing tobacco. A closer inspection of the goods within the bag revealed that none of the products had the correct Health Warnings as required and prescribed by the Tobacco Products (Manufacture, Presentation and Sale) (Safety) Regulations 2002 as amended. I then brought this to the attention of Ms [REDACTED] and at 11:49am I issued her with a Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984: Code B Notice explaining our powers and
30 that further search will be made and any goods found or believed to be counterfeit and/or illicit will be seized in order to ascertain whether an offence has been committed. HMRC officers had also identified a number of things they were unhappy with and requested to speak with the owner. At this point my colleague [REDACTED] had joined me and I explained to him what was happening and requested that he assisted me completing the inspection

colleagues and I assisted in placing the bottles of alcohol being seized by HMRC into
boxes and then have them moved to the back of the shop to be collected by an HMRC
vehicle. Whilst moving the boxes to the back at 13:40 an Asian male wearing a turban
arrived and stated that he is the owner of the business, he provided his name as Amrik
50 Singh ARORA the Director of Good Morning Superstore Ltd. Once we finished moving all
the boxes to the back of the shop we left the shop with seal bag E02111 and left the
HMRC officers at the shop as they waited for their vehicle to arrive. Back at the office the
goods were booked into the evidence store.



WITNESS STATEMENT OF KEN BUZOR

**Visit to Good Morning Superstore, 262 Stratfield Road, Harrow HA3 9BY
on 24th February 2016.**

I, [REDACTED], Fraud Investigation Officer of Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs, (HMRC) based at Custom House, 20 Lower Thames Street, London EC3R 6EE, WILL SAY as follows:


1. On 24th February 2016, accompanied by other Officers of HMRC and Officers of Harrow Trading Standards, I attended GOOD MORNING SUPERSTORE, 262 Stratfield Road, Harrow HA3 9BY under the authority of section 112 of the Customs & Excise Management Act 1979 (CEMA). I entered the premises at 09:50 hours.
2. The shop sales assistant, who identified himself to me as MR [REDACTED], was present throughout the visit. I introduced myself to MR [REDACTED] and explained that the purpose of the visit was to conduct an inspection of tobacco and alcohol products in the shop.
3. MR [REDACTED] said that he was the previous owner of Good Morning Superstore, that he sold the business a year and half ago and that he has worked as the Shop Assistant since then.
4. A request was made to MR [REDACTED] to produce invoices for the beer and wins in the shop. MR [REDACTED] A red boxed folder containing invoices was produced. The invoices were inspected and found not to contain any canned beer. MR [REDACTED] was asked to produce invoices for the canned beer.
5. MRS [REDACTED], also shop sales assistant, said attempts have been made to contact the shop owner, to no avail. MRS [REDACTED] said the shop manager will arrive by noon.

6. At 11:41 hours, MRS [REDACTED] said the shop owner was on the line and handed me a mobile phone. A man identified himself to me as MR AMRIK ARORA said he was the owner of Good Morning Superstore and that he was currently in Manchester. I asked MR ARORA for invoices for the canned beer and MR ARORA said the invoices were with his accountant in Croydon. MR ARORA said it would be difficult to get the invoices to me because of distance. I gave MR ARORA my official email address and asked that the invoices be scanned and emailed to me to save time. MR ARORA said he will inform his accountant and call back once expected time of email is confirmed.
7. At 12:13 hours, a man arrived and identified himself to me as MR [REDACTED], the Shop manager. MR [REDACTED] said he has no other invoices aside those in the red boxed folder.
8. At 12:26 hours, MR [REDACTED] handed me a mobile phone to speak to MR ARORA. MR ARORA said his accountant will have the invoices for the beer scanned to me within the hour. I informed MR ARORA that I shall give him till 14:30 hours.
9. At 13:07 hours, I received an email on my official phone with 8 x scanned copies of invoices attached. I inspected the invoices and found 5 x cases of Fosters beer, 2 x cases of Kaliber beer and 4 x cases of bottles Stella beer.
10. At 13:23 hours, I replied to the email, asking for further invoices for canned beer only. At 14:19 hours, I received another email with the same 8 x scanned copies of invoices attached
11. At 14:39 hours, MR ARORA informed me over the mobile phone that his accountant could not find the invoices.
12. At 14:40 hours, I seized a total of 2386 litres of beer under authority of sections 139 of CEMA as they were liable to forfeiture on the basis that, on the balance of probability, the UK excise duty had not been paid.
13. I completed and issued an ENF156 Seizure Information Notice and an ENF3174 Warning Letter, acknowledged by [REDACTED], along with a copy of Public Notice12A booklet which explains the right to appeal the seizure

14. I left the premises at 19:50 hours after HMRC contractors had uplifted the seized beer.
15. The loss of revenue for the seized goods amounts to £2,654.42 Excise Duty, plus £817.26 VAT.
16. I have been asked by an Officer of Harrow Trading Standards what, if any, offences are committed in general terms relevant to the evasion of excise duty. The relevant overarching criminal offence is one of being knowingly concerned in the fraudulent evasion of excise duty contrary to section 170 of the Customs & Excise Management Act 1979. However, the decision made on this occasion was to seize the goods only, thereby limiting this to civil proceedings only.

Mrs [REDACTED] then confirmed the owner of the business who I know as Mr Amrik Singh Arora was not in the premise during the time of our visit.






