In this edition you will hear from one of our out-of-borough schools, Benwick Primary in Cambridgeshire. The headteacher, Clare Talbot, shares best practice regarding the education of our CLA. You will also find the range of enrichment activities our students took part in over the Summer and Autumn Terms.

As you are aware, from September the role of the Virtual School has been extended to promote the education of children with a social worker. 

It takes place once a month and recommenced in October. The children are sent their books and a 'goody' parcel of stationary in advance of the sessions. Our carers are always on hand to support our less confident readers by either reading to them or with them.

Our 'Ravenous Readers' group is lead by Kathryn, Joanne and Michelle . The session provides thought provoking discussions, quizzes, riddles, games and images

The children had a special treat when the author Elys Dolan: "Knighthood for Beginners", and the poet Adisa the Verbaliser joined a reading session. Adisa sent the children a signed copy of his book: "Lip Hopping with the Fundi-Fu". The children were fascinated with the context to his po-



ems. They continue engage well in the club and have all developed a thirst for reading.



Philosophy Club

We commissioned <u>The Philosophy Foundation</u> to run an after school club targeting children in Key Stage 2.

Our objective is to develop children's critical thinking skills which in turn will help them to build an understanding of themselves, each other and the world.

The children were presented with a stimulus i.e a story, a poem or a short film and to initiate dialogue. Some examples of questions posed to the children were:

- What constitutes freedom?
- Is there such a thing as infinity?
- Would it be better to be a unhappy prince/ princess or a happy pig?

This club is one of our newer initiatives and we are pleased that, even some of our reticent children made every effort to participate.

Chelsea Physic Garden

We were especially pleased to have a project targeted at our younger students. Pupils in EYFS and Key Stage I from Harrow, Ealing and Brent Virtual Schools and their families were invited to a day at Chelsea Physic Garden. Our youngest student was 4 years old and was

accompanied by his teenage mother and his grandmother.

Activities included a tour of the garden, which dates back to 1673. There were numerous medicinal plants and fragrant herbs. The children selected the ingredients to make their own herbal teabags. The families were also gifted a muslin cloth with herbs to support sleep by putting it under their pillows. The group were also shown how to make a terrarium using a glass

bottle with layers of grit, charcoal, soil, a few small plants and mini plastic toys.

The children expressed that they enjoyed their visit and that they learned something new. All the adults said the visit had met their expectations including one who added that it was their first time visiting a private garden.

Opera Holland Park

The Opera Holland Park Project was a 5 day Summer Holiday programme for children in Key Stage 2. It was based on the staging of Janacek's "Cunning Little Vixen", a story based on the circle of life. The sessions were run on a hybrid basis with online sessions starting in June and face-to-face meetings during the summer holidays. .

The children engaged in singing lessons from their resident music teacher who was also a professional baritone. They also enjoyed drama games, story-boarding, improvisation of parts of the story and Origami.

As the play was set in woodlands and had characters that depicted various animals. The organiser was keen to link the learning by inviting a local ecologist. The ecologist brought a number of stuffed woodland animals that were cast-offs from the National History Museum. The children were not very impressed by the practice of stuffing animals but were able to identify the fox, badger and rabbit as well as the giant plastic insects, all of whom appear in the opera.

The ecologist also led the children on a trail around Holland Park and to the Ecology Centre; they were taught how to identify trees, flowers, insects and other wildlife. They also collected flora which they used to create interesting and exotic fox masks.

After the final performance, cast members and the play's Director came to meet the children to discuss the play and to answer their questions.

Arvon Lumb Bank Residential

Arvon's Lumb Bank Centre is an old mill house set in the stunning hills of West Yorkshire once owned by Ted Hughes. This was a residential trip poetry writing trip for students in Key Stages 4 and 5. It was targeted for young people with English as an additional language.

Throughout the week, the young people participated in poetry writing workshops. They were supported by resident tutors and Kat. The organisers invited Testament who is a professional poet and dramatist. He gave a performance and worked with the group on developing their poetry writing skills. During the visit Kat facilitated 2 of our young people in attending a Mosque in Halifax to celebrate Eid. The students were pleased that they could attend.


There was a group rota system for cooking the evening meals and for clearing up. The students could cook their own breakfast if they wished to. One morning a student made pancakes for everyone. The students brought cards and board games from home which they enjoyed playing in the evenings.

Across the week the young people grew in

confidence and on the final evening they read their poems to the group.

The young people felt that the week has been very positive. They made new friends and commented that the atmosphere was relaxed. Knowing that they were all in care meant that they could talk openly about their experiences which is often not possible in school.

The students also participated in a post-Arvon workshop last month. They were happy to see the tutors and fellow students again. Their poems are being collated into a book and they will receive their copy soon!



Meet Our Partners

Benwick Primary School, Cambridgeshire

Clare Talbot, Head teacher at Benwick Primary School in Cambridgeshire has been teaching for 25 years in 5 counties across the UK in 10 mainstream schools of sizes varying from 45 on roll to 400 on roll. This is her second Headship after 15 years in Leadership roles. She is also the Designated Teacher for Children Looked After and attends the PEP meetings and CLA Reviews.

Benwick is a small rural primary school with 4 mixed age classes in Fenland Cambridgeshire. This is a low social mobility area with high deprivation. 41% Pupil Premium and 25% SEND (25% of this with EHCPs).

In order to support vulnerable groups, the school has put into place the following practices: -Step-On - a therapeutic approach to behaviour - whole school trained and behaviour policy built on this principle; -Support form local SEND Services - vital in a whole team approach observations and strategies recommended by specialist teachers and EP team;

-Close liaison with Carers: -1:1 support for pupils are required; -Attachment and SEMH training for staff; -ELSA/ELKLAN training for staff: -Updated Step-On training for Staff; -Roots & Fruits Anxiety Mapping used for vulnerable pupils to put pupils at the centre of the support in place -Risk reduction plans used by all staff to support behaviour and learning needs; -SMART targets regularly reviewed; -Trusted adult & safe space strategies used to support individuals; -Forest Schools activities.

The school have had to adapt their curriculum and teaching approaches to meet the needs of vulnerable groups. Some children need a bespoke timetable as their readiness for learning is not yet fully developed. They use 'now and next' boards and 5 point scales charts to promote independence and self-regulation. They also have a bespoke curriculum involving forest schools and activities following individual interests and needs developed

alongside the class curriculum.

To support children who have experience trauma, Benwick Primary taps into Blue Smile counselling, liaises with social workers, carers, health and other professionals forming a team around the child approach which includes the strategies already mentioned in this article.

Benwick has many CLA under the care of many local authorities and Clare's regular feedback on pupils' ePEP online secure platform has been its ease of use, easily saved, accessible remotely, accessible by delegated team members supporting the child and helps promote a whole child development ethic. It can be added to when relevant which ensures the information is always up to date and the most recent information is available
