About 2020 and 2021 data

This 2021 SEN profile reports the January 2021 school census data about pupils aged 3 to 19 with SEN at Harrow's primary, secondary and special schools, and compares to the national picture. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic schools were not open throughout the whole of the 2019-20 and 2020-21 academic years, resulting in incomparable datasets to previous years. The impact of this on this report is stated below. Chapters 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 (Demographic related chapters) have been updated with 2021 data.

Chapter 8 (Exclusions) is updated with the 2020 and 2021 data which is not directly comparable to previous years.

Chapters 7, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 (Attendance and Key Stage results) and the scorecards contain the most recent available data.

Special Educational Needs (SEN) terms

SEN provision is collected for all pupils on roll (enrolled as Current or Dual-Main) on the relevant census day in the spring (January) census. As at the 2021 school census SEN provision equals 'E' (Education, Health and Care plan) or 'K' (SEN support).

The 2015 SEND code of practice removed the requirement for separate 'school action' and 'school action plus' categories – these were replaced by a single 'SEN support' category.

The Children and Families Act 2014 replaced 'SEN statements' with 'Education, Health and Care plans (EHC plans)¹. Up to April 2018, schools were able to record pupils as either having 'S' (Statement) or 'E' (EHC plan).

The pupil SEN type records the nature (type) of a pupil's special educational need. The primary need and, where appropriate, any secondary need is recorded. This data is collected in the spring census. The tables below list the old and new pupil SEN provisions and pupil SEN types.



The number of pupils with SEN in Harrow has increased to 4,841


The total number of pupils with SEN across Harrow's state-funded schools, increased from 4,774 in 2020 to 4,841 in 2021, this increase is in line to a steady increase of pupils with SEN between 2017 and 2020, from 4,630 to 4,774. The increase is due to increasing numbers of pupils with SEN EHCP/Statement – as can be seen in the EHCP/Statement chart below.

The number of pupils on SEN support fluctuated from 3,600 in 2017 to a 5-year high of 3,651 in 2019 and then dropped to a 5-year low of 3,568 in 2021.

The number of statements/EHC plans has continued to increase from 1,030 in 2017 to 1,273 in 2021, representing a 24% increase over this period, and a 7.0% increase between 2020 and 2021.

The percentage of Pupils with SEN slightly increased in 2021 at 12.7%...


The percentage of pupils with SEN increased slightly from 12.6% in 2020 to 12.7% in 2021; compared to a slight increase from 13.8% in 2020 to 14% in 2021 in Statistical Neighbours and 15.2% in 2020 to 15.6% in 2021 nationally. The slight increase in Harrow is due to the increase of the percentage of pupils with EHCP from 3.1% in 2020 to 3.3% in 2021 whilst the number of SEN Support has continued to drop over the years, from 9.5% in 2020 to 9.4% in 2021. Both the statements/EHCP in statistical neighbours and England, increased in 2021 whereas the SEN Support remained stable in England but dropped in statistical neighbours.

The main primary need in 2021 is SLCN for pupils with SEN

In 2021, 32.6% of pupils with SEN had the primary need Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN), making it the most common primary need, in-line with England at 22.6%. The second most common primary need in Harrow is Moderate Learning difficulty (MLD) - 16.7% pupils. MLD ranks as the 2nd most common need nationally (18.1%).

About Harrow Schools

Harrow is an outer London borough in the northwest of London. It has 59 state funded schools², 1 nursery, 41 primary, 12 secondary, 1 all-through and 4 special schools. There are 38,094 pupils in these state funded schools. Specifically, 66 pupils in nursery, 21,896 pupils in primary, 14,375 pupils in secondary, 1,341 pupils in all-through and 482 pupils in special state-funded education³.

Of the 41 primary state-funded schools, 24 are community schools (14,737), 3 are voluntary aided schools (1,204) and 14 are academy and free Schools (5,955). Of the 12 secondary schools, 1 is a community school (1,713 pupils), 11 are academies (12,662 pupils) and the all-through school (1,341).

Special schools can specialise in 1 of the 4 areas of special educational needs: communication and interaction, cognition and learning, social, emotional and mental health; and sensory and physical needs. Schools can further specialise within these categories to reflect the special needs they help with, for example Autistic Spectrum Disorders (ASD), Visual Impairment (VI), or Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN).

- 50% of Harrow's state funded school pupils are boys and 50% are girls. These figures are in line with the national figures (51% and 49% respectively).
- 36.8% (from 36.1% in 2015-16) of Harrow's state funded school pupils have English as their first language while 62.9% have any other language than English (0.3% as unclassified). In contrast, nationally, a higher proportion of pupils have English as their first language (80.4%) while 19.3% have any other language than English (0.4% are considered as unclassified).
- 15.0% (from 10.2% in 2015-16) of Harrow's state funded school pupils are eligible for Free School Meals while the national figure is higher at 20.8%.
- The four ethnic groups with the highest proportions of pupils in Harrow's state funded schools are: Indian 24.5% (from 20.7% in 2015-16), Any other Asian background 18.6% (from 20.2% in 2015-16), Any other White background 16.6% (from 13.9% in 2015-16) and White British 8.6% (from 12.1% in 2015-16). The figures for these ethnic groups nationally are 3.3%, 1.9%, 6.8% and 64.9%, respectively.
- The vast majority of pupils who attend Harrow's state funded schools reside in the borough of Harrow (85.9%) whereas 14.1% (increased 1.8% in the last 6 years) reside outside the borough of Harrow⁴.

1. An overview of SEN in Harrow's schools

Chapter 1 at a glance...

- > Pupils with a SEN increased in 2021 for the fifth consecutive year.
- > Pupils on SEN support in 2021 decreased since last year.
- > The number of pupils with SEN EHCP increased in 2021 for the fifth consecutive year.
- > The main primary need of pupils on SEN Support in Harrow and England is Speech, Language and Communication Needs.
- The most common secondary need of pupils with SEN Support in Harrow and England is Social, Emotional and Mental Health.
- > The main primary need of pupils with SEN with an EHCP in Harrow and England is Autistic Spectrum Disorder.
- The main secondary need of pupils with a Statement or EHCP in Harrow is Autistic Spectrum Disorder and England is Speech, Language and Communications Needs.
- Of Harrow's schools' pupils with SEN residing in Harrow the highest number live in the Wealdstone ward and the smallest number live in the Pinner ward.
- > The highest number of Harrow's schools' pupils residing outside of Harrow live in Brent.
- > The proportion of pupils on SEN Support has decreased in primary schools and increased in secondary schools from 2020 to 2021. Harrow is in line with the national picture.
- > The proportion of pupils with a SEN EHCP has increased in primary schools and decreased in secondary schools from 2020 to 2021. Harrow is not in line with the national picture.
- > The main primary need in primary schools in Harrow and England is Speech, Language and Communications Needs.
- > The main primary need in secondary schools in Harrow is Moderate Learning Difficulty and in England is Social, Emotional and Mental Health.
- > The main primary need in special schools in Harrow is Severe Learning Difficulty and in England is Autistic Spectrum Disorder.
- Severe Learning Difficulty, Autistic Spectrum Disorder and Moderate Learning Difficulty are the primary needs that all special schools in Harrow are approved to provide provision for.

1.1 Pupils with SEN by Provision – 2017 to 2021

The percentage of pupils with special education needs (SEN) increased slightly across Harrow's state-funded schools, from 12.6% (4,774) in 2020 to 12.7% (4,821) in 2021. This slight increase is in contrast to the drop seen in previous years, from 12.9% (4,663) in 2017 to 12.8% (4,770) in 2019. The picture nationally was 15.6% in 2021, from 15.2% in 2020, compared to 14.3% in 2017. The Statistical Neighbours figures increased from 13.2% in 2017 to 14.0% in 2021.

The increase in the percentage of pupils with special educational needs is due to the increase in the pupils with a SEN statement or Education, Health and Care (EHC) plan. The percentage of pupils with SEN statement or EHCP increased from 3.1% (1,190) in 2020 to 3.3% (1,273) in 2021. This increase is in line with previous years where the figures in Harrow increased from 2.9% (1,030) in 2017 to 3.0% (1,119) in 2019. In line the National figures increased from 2.8% in 2017 to 3.6% in 2021. The Statistical Neighbours figures also increased from 2.9% in 2017 to 3.8% in 2021.

The percentage of pupils on SEN Support in Harrow dropped slightly from 9.5% (3,584) in 2020 to 9.4% (3,568) in 2021. This drop is in line with previous years where the figures in Harrow dropped from 10.1% (3,600) in 2017 to 9.8% (3,651) in 2019. In contrast the National figures dropped from 11.5% in 2016 to 11.4% in 2017 but then increased to 11.9% in 2021. In contrast to National figures, the Statistical Neighbours figures increased from 10.3% in 2017 to 10.5% in 2019 and then dropped to 10.2% in 2021 (see table and chart below).



1.2 Pupils with SEN by Provision and Primary Need

Pupils with SEN

In 2021, Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) is the most common primary need for pupils with SEN across Harrow's schools, representing one third (32.6%) of pupils. Harrow's proportion of pupils with SEN with SLCN is higher than both the Statistical Neighbours and national averages of 29.3% and 22.6% respectively. Moderate Learning Difficulty is the second most common primary need, with 16.7% of pupils with SEN in Harrow, compared to 18.1% of pupils nationally and 13.3% of pupils in Statistical Neighbours' schools. Table 3 below shows pupils who are sole or dual main registrations but excludes state-funded nursery schools and pupil referral units.

Pupils on SEN support

In 2021, Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) is the most common primary need for pupils on SEN support across Harrow's schools, representing just above one third (35.7%) of pupils. Harrow's proportion of pupils on SEN support with SLCN is higher than the national average of 24.4%. Moderate Learning Difficulty is the second most common primary need in Harrow's schools with 18.8% of pupils, compared to 20.5% of pupils in England. Table 3 below shows pupils who are sole or dual main registrations but excludes state-funded nursery schools and pupil referral units.

As can be seen in Table 4 below, Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) has been the most common primary need for pupils on SEN support over the last five years, 2017-2021. Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD) and Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) were the second and third most common primary needs over this period. Table 4 includes pupils who are sole or dual main registrations but excludes state-funded nursery schools and pupil referral units.

Pupils with statements/EHC plans

Pupils with statements/EHC plans across Harrow's and England's state-funded schools are more likely to have either Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD), Speech, Language and Communications Needs (SLCN), Severe Learning Difficulty (SLD), Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD) or Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) as a primary need than any other need.

Of Harrow's 1,273 pupils with a statement or EHC plan, 346 (27.2%) have ASD as a primary need, this is slightly lower than 30.6% nationally, followed by SLCN (24.0%), SLD (14.3%) and MLD (10.8%). In contrast, pupils with statements/ EHC plans in Harrow are less likely to have SEMH (5.3%) than in England (14.4%). Table 5 below shows pupils who are sole or dual main registrations but excludes state-funded nursery schools and pupil referral units.

For pupils with a statement or EHC plan, Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) has been the most common primary need in each of the last five years, fluctuating from 284 (27.6%) pupils in 2017 to 320 (28.6%) in 2019 and then to 346 (27.2%) in 2021, compared to a continuous increase nationally.

The second highest primary need Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) has continued to increase, from 194 pupils (18.8%) in 2017 to 306 pupils (24.0%) in 2021, which is inline with the national picture.

The number of pupils with statements/EHC plans and the primary need Severe Learning Difficulty (SLD) has continued to increase over the last 5 years, from 157 (15.2%) in 2017 to 182 (14.3%) in 2021. In contrast, the national figure dropped from 12.9% in 2017 to 10.4% in 2021.

1.3 Area of Residence of Pupils with SEN by Provision

Whilst Harrow's schools' pupils mainly reside within Harrow, approximately one seventh (14.1%) live outside the borough. The pupils who live outside mainly reside in Harrow's neighbouring boroughs or outside of Greater London.



The highest proportion of SEN pupils live in the following four wards - Wealdstone (7.5%), Roxbourne (7.1%), Harrow Weald (6.6%) and Greenhill (6.6%). The highest proportion of SEN Support pupils live in the following three wards - Wealdstone (7.9%), Harrow Weald (6.8%) Roxbourne (6.7%) and Greenhill (6.7%). The highest proportion of pupils with a statement or EHC Plan live in the following three wards - Roxbourne (8.0%), Wealdstone (6.3%) and Greenhill (6.1%).



Primary Need by Harrow Ward of Residence

The tables below show the primary need of Harrow's school pupils by the Harrow ward that they reside in. The first table includes the primary needs with the higher number of pupils and the second table the primary needs with the lower numbers of pupils

SLCN is the primary need with the highest number of pupils, and the highest proportions live in the following wards – Roxbourne (7.9%), Wealdstone (7.5%) and Marlborough (6.5%). MLD has the second highest number of pupils, and the highest proportions live in the following wards – Harrow Weald (9.9%), Wealdstone (8.7%) and Greenhill (8.3%). The third largest primary need is SEMH and the highest proportions of these pupils live in – Roxbourne (7.6%), Wealdstone (7.4%) and Greenhill (7.2%).

1.5 Pupils with SEN by Provision and Secondary Need

Pupils on SEN support

In 2021, Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH), Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN), Moderate Learning Difficulties (MLD) and Specific Learning Difficulties (SPLD) are the main secondary needs for pupils on SEN support across schools in Harrow and England. 117 (22.1%) and 104 (19.6%) of Harrow's school pupils on SEN support have SEMH and SLCN as a secondary need, respectively. 93 pupils have a Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD 17.5%) and 69 have a Specific Learning Difficulty (SPLD 13.0%) as a secondary need. In comparison, the percentage of pupils on SEN support with SPLD as a secondary need are just above the national average whereas SEMH, SLCN or MLD are lower than the national.

Pupils with statements/EHC plans

For pupils with statements/EHC plans, Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) Speech, is the highest secondary need across schools in Harrow – 27.5% (148 pupils), and the second highest secondary need in England (14.6%). The second highest secondary need in Harrow is Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) – 23.7% (128 pupils) and the highest secondary need in England (28.5%).

1.7 Pupils with SEN by School Type and Provision – 2017 to 2021

Pupils on SEN support

The number of pupils on SEN support in Harrow's state-funded primary schools has fluctuated from 2,209 (56.1%) in 2017 to a 5-year low of 2,167 (53.2%) in 2021, compared to 57.0% in 2017 and 54.2% in 2021 nationally.

In Harrow's state-funded secondary schools, the number of pupils on SEN support has fluctuated in the past five years from 1,389 (35.3%) in 2017 to 1,398 (34.3%) in 2021. In comparison nationally the percentage of pupils on SEN support in secondary schools has fluctuated from 34.4% in 2017 to 37.1% in 2021.

In special schools, the number of pupils on SEN support has remained very small, with as little as 0 pupils in 2020; up to 5 pupils in 2019 and 3 pupils in 2021; Harrow's percentages are below national averages.

In Independent schools, the number of pupils on SEN support significantly increased from 273 (6.9%) in 2017 to 482 (11.8%) in 2021. Harrow's percentages are well above national averages of 6.7% and 7.4% in 2017 and 2021 respectively (see Table 12).



Pupils with statements/EHC plans

The number and percentage of pupils with a statement/EHC plan in Harrow's state-funded primary schools increased over the past 5 years from 328 (30.3%) in 2017 to 488 (37.2%) in 2021. Harrow's percentages have consistently been higher than the national figures of 25.8% and 29.4% in 2017 and 2021 respectively.

In Harrow's state-funded secondary schools, the number of pupils with a statement/EHC plan has fluctuated over the last few years, from 263 (24.3%) in 2017 to 253 (21.9%) in 2019 and then to 306 (23.3%) in 2021. Harrow's proportion of pupils has been higher than national over the last five years.

In Harrow's special schools, the number of pupils with a statement/EHC plan has gradually increased each year from 439 (40.6%) in 2017 to 479 (36.5%) in 2021. Despite the increase in the numbers, the proportion is dropping, which is parallel to the drop nationally since 2018.

In Independent schools, the number of pupils with a statement/EHCP fluctuated from 44 (4.1%) in 2017 to 20 (1.8%) in 2018 and then to 31 (2.4%) in 2021. Harrow's 2018 to 2021 percentages are significantly below the national averages for these years, as can be seen in Table 13 below.



1.8 Pupils with SEN by School Type and Primary Need – 2021

In 2021, Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) is the main primary need across Harrow's primary schools. Of the 2,655 pupils with SEN in primary schools, 1,232 (46.4%) have SLCN as their main primary need, compared to 41.0% of the Statistical Neighbours and 32.7% nationally. Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD) is the second most common primary need in Harrow's primary schools, with 379 Pupils with SEN (14.3%) having MLD as their primary need, this is higher than the Statistical Neighbours average of 11.0% but lower than the national average of 18.3%. The percentages of pupils with other primary needs are in line with the national picture, see Table 14.

The main primary needs across Harrow's primary and secondary schools are quite different. Table 14 below shows the main primary needs in 2021 in Harrow's secondary schools, these are Moderate Learning Difficulty - 360, 21.1% (SN – 17.0%, nationally – 20.0%), Social, Emotional and Mental Health - 300, 17.6% (SN – 20.7%, nationally – 21.5%) and Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) - 297, 17.4% (SN – 18.6%, nationally – 12.0%).

For pupils with SEN in Harrow's special schools, Severe Learning Difficulty - 174, 36.1% (SN – 18.3%, nationally – 20.3%), Autistic Spectrum Disorder - 109, 22.6% (SN – 40.9%, nationally – 32.3%) and Moderate Learning Difficulty - 68, 14.1% (SN – 13.1%, nationally – 11.1%) are the main primary needs in 2021.



1.9 Approved Provision for Primary Needs in Special Schools

An approved provision type is the type of primary need for which a school is formally approved to make provision¹⁹. In 2021, there are 4 special schools in Harrow and 1,060 special schools in England. All 4 of Harrow's special schools provide the following needs: Severe Learning Difficulty (SLD), Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD). 174 pupils in Harrow's 4 special schools (36.1%) have the primary need Severe Learning Difficulty, 109 pupils (22.6%) have Autistic Spectrum Disorder and 68 pupils (14.1%) have Moderate Learning Difficulty.

Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN), Profound & Multiple Learning Difficulty (PMLD) and Specific Learning Difficulty (SPLD) have been approved for provision in 3 of Harrow's special schools. In 2021, the following percentage of pupils in special schools have SLCN (10.4%, 50 pupils), PMLD (9.5%, 46 pupils) and SPLD (1.9%, 9 pupils) as a primary need. This is overall in-line with the national picture.

2. Age and Gender

Chapter 2 at a glance...

- > The number of boys on SEN support outnumbers the number of girls on SEN support by almost 2:1.
- > In 2021, SEN support was most prevalent among 7 year-old boys and 14 year-old girls.
- > The number of boys with a statement/EHC plan outnumbers the number of girls with a statement/EHC plan by approximately 5:2.
- > In 2021, EHC plan was most prevalent among 9 year-old boys and 8 year-old girls.
- > In 2021, there are more boys than girls on SEN support for all primary needs.
- In 2021, there are more boys than girls with SEN EHC plan for almost all primary needs (except Profound & Multiple Learning Difficulty and Multi-Sensory Impairment).
- In 2010, boys and girls on SEN Support plan have Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) as the most prevalent primary need.
- In 2021, boys with an EHC plan have Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) as the most prevalent primary need, compared to girls with an EHC plan who have Speech, Language and communication needs (SLCN) as the most prevalent primary need.

2.1 Pupils with SEN by Age, Gender and Provision

Pupils on SEN support

Across Harrow's state-funded schools²⁰, there is a significant difference in the number of pupils on SEN support by gender and age in 2021. The number of boys (2,290 64.2%) on SEN support is significantly higher than the number of girls (1,278 35.8%) at all ages. For pupils aged 3 and under, 29 boys were on SEN support, this is 4 times more than the 7 girls on SEN support. For pupils on SEN support aged between 4 and 11 years old, the ratio of the number of boys to girls is approximately 2:1, and for the number of pupils on SEN support aged 12 and older, the ratio is much narrower than 3:2. Overall, the number of boys on SEN support has outnumbered the number of girls on SEN support by just lower than 2:1. See Table 16 below and further details are available in Appendix A2).



In 2021, SEN support was most prevalent among 7 year-old boys and 14 year-old girls, representing 10.4% and 10.5% respectively. SEN support was also prevalent among 9 year old boys representing 9.7% and among 10 year old girls representing 9.9% (See Figure 4).

Pupils with statements/EHC plans

Across Harrow's state-funded schools²⁴, boys (921 - 72.3%) are far more likely to have a statement/EHC plan than girls (352 - 27.7%). 3 out of 4 pupils, aged 3 and under who have an EHC plan are boys. For pupils aged between 4 and over, the ratio of boys to girls is approximately more than 5:2.

Overall, the number of boys with a statement/EHC plan has outnumbered the number of girls with a statement/EHC plan by approximately 5:2, see Table 17 below and further details are available in Appendix A3.



In 2021, EHCP was most prevalent among 9 year-old boys and 8 year-old girls, representing 10.3% and 10.8% respectively. SEN EHCP was also prevalent among 10 year-old boys representing 9.2% and among 12 year old girls representing 10.2% (See Figure 4 below).

In 2021, there were some deviations among age groups for primary needs in Harrow's schools²⁸. For pupils on SEN support, a significant proportion had Speech Language and Communication Needs (SLCN), Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD) and Social, Emotional or Mental Health (SEMH) a primary need.

The primary need SLCN (1,273 pupils) is mainly dominant among the youngest pupils on SEN support, in particular, ages 7 and under (see figure 8). As pupils get older, the likelihood of SLCN decreases. In 2021, 80.6% of 3 year-olds or younger had SLCN, compared to 66.0% nationally. This declined to 14.6% of 13 year-olds and 11.1% of 16 and over year-olds, compared to 10.8% and 7.4% nationally. This overall trend is parallel to the picture nationally.





Figure 9 below shows that Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD) is dominant among Harrow's 9 to 12 year olds on SEN support, which is in-line with the national trend. The level of disparity of the proportion of pupils up to the age of 7 between Harrow and the national increases as the age of pupils increases.



Figure 10 below shows that for pupils on SEN support with SEMH as a primary need, that as pupils get older, the likelihood of SEMH increases. In 2021, 6.8% of 4 year-olds had SEMH, compared to 11.3% nationally. This increased to 18.0% of 11 year-olds and 14.8% of 16 and over year-olds, compared to 21.9% and 17.6% nationally. This overall trend is parallel to the picture nationally.

Pupils with statements/EHC plans

In 2021, there were some deviations among age groups for primary needs in Harrow's schools. A significant proportion of pupils with an EHC Plan had Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD), Speech Language and Communication Needs (SLCN), Severe Learning Difficulty (SLD), or Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD) as a primary need.

ASD is the most predominant primary need of all pupils with an EHC plan (27.2%) and among pupils over the age of 16 in Harrow's schools, with 39.8% of pupils compared to 30.4% nationally³⁶. Tables 19a and 19b below suggest that the likelihood of having ASD as a primary need fluctuates across the school ages which is in line with the national overall trend. Please note that Table 19a shows the number of each age group with a particular need as a percentage of the total number in the age group.

SLCN is the second most common primary need of pupils with EHC plan (24.0%). It is the most predominant need among age 6 pupils, 33.0% of pupils compared to 23.5% nationally³⁷. Tables 19a and 19b suggest that the likelihood of having SLCN as a primary need fluctuates across the school ages. The overall national trend is to decrease.

2.3 Pupils with SEN by Gender, Provision and Primary Need

Pupils on SEN support

Table 20 below shows that in 2021 there were more boys (2,290) than girls (1,278) on SEN support, as well as for each primary need. A significant number of boys on SEN support (903, 39.4%) have Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) as a primary need, in comparison to 29.0%, 370 girls. Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD) is the second most prevalent need for 17.1% - 392 boys, and 21.8% - 278 girls.

Pupils with statements/EHC plans

In 2021, a majority of the pupils with a statement or an EHC plan were boys (921) compared to 352 girls. A significantly high number of the boys – 295 (32.0%) - have Autistic Spectrum Disorder as their main primary need, compared to only 51 girls – 14.5%. The main primary need for girls is Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN), with 21.6% - 76 girls and 25.0% - 230 boys (see Table 21 below).

3. Free School Meal Eligibility

Chapter 3 at a glance...

- > The proportion of pupils with SEN in Harrow who are eligible for Free School meals are significantly lower (more than 10% lower) than in England.
- Pupils on SEN support in Harrow and England with Social, Emotional and Mental Health as a primary need have the highest proportion of eligibility for Free School Meals.
- Pupils with an EHC plan in both Harrow and England with Social, Emotional and Mental Health as a primary need have the highest proportion of eligibility for Free School Meals.


3.1 Pupils with SEN by FSM Eligibility and Provision

Across Harrow's primary, secondary and special schools, 1,194 (24.7%) out of a total of 4,841 pupils with SEN are eligible for free school meals (FSMs), this is lower than 35.1% of pupils with SEN nationally.

For pupils on SEN support, 850 (23.8%) of 3,568 pupils are eligible for FSMs, compared to 34.3% nationally. For pupils with statements or EHC plans, 344 (27.0%) of 1,273 pupils were eligible for FSMs, this is significantly lower than the national average at 37.9%.

As a result, the percentage of Harrow's school pupils with SEN, eligible for FSMs has been lower than nationally, as can be seen in Figure 7 below:

3.2 Pupils with SEN by FSM Eligibility, Provision and Primary Need

Pupils on SEN support

Across Harrow's schools, the proportion of pupils on SEN support eligible for free school meals (FSM) by primary need is significantly different to the national average. A significant number of pupils with Social, Emotional and Mental Health (181, 33.8%), Moderate Learning Difficulty (193, 28.8%) or Speech, Language and Communications Needs (245, 19.2%) are eligible for FSM. However, these percentages are still somewhat lower than the national averages for not only these needs but all primary needs in Harrow – see Table 22 below.

Pupils with statements/EHC plans

The proportion of pupils in 2021 with statements/EHC plans eligible for free school meals (FSM) by primary need is quite different to the national average. In Harrow's schools the following primary needs had the highest proportions of FSM eligibility: MSI - 40.0% (2 pupils); SEMH - 38.2% (63 pupils); SPLD - 37.5% (15 pupils) and MLD - 32.8% (45 pupils), compared to 29.2%, 49.0%, 33.1%, and 42.6% nationally. Overall Harrow's proportion of pupils eligible for FSM by primary need is lower than nationally, as can be seen in Table 23 below.

- > The highest proportion of pupils with SEN Support by ethnic group in Harrow's schools belong to the Any Other Asian Background ethnic group.
- The highest proportion of pupils with an EHC plan by ethnic group in Harrow's schools belongs to the Any Other Asian Background ethnic group.
- Pupils on SEN support of Any Other White Background, Any Other Asian Background, Indian and White-British ethnic groups are more likely to have Speech, Language & Communication Needs (SLCN) as a primary need.
- > Pupils with an EHC plan of White British, Any Other White Background and Indian ethnic groups are more likely to have Autistic Spectrum Disorder as a primary need.

4.1 Pupils with SEN by Ethnicity

In 2021, the highest proportion of pupils with SEN are of Any Other Asian Background (18.0% - 868 pupils) and the second highest group are of Indian ethnic origin (15.4% - 746 pupils), compared to 1.4% and 1.8% nationally. Pupils of Chinese and Gypsy / Roma ethnicities make up the lowest proportion of pupils with SEN at 0.3% (15 pupils) and 0.1% (3 pupils) respectively, compared to 0.2% and 0.5% nationally. The Harrow and National SEN figures may differ greatly, but they are broadly in-line with the proportion of ethnicities of the whole pupil population.

Pupils on SEN support

In 2021, the highest proportion of pupils on SEN support are of Any Other Asian Background (17.7% - 631 pupils) and 14.5% (516 pupils) were of Indian ethnic origin, compared to 1.2% and 1.7% nationally. Chinese and Gypsy / Roma pupils on SEN support make up the lowest proportion of Pupils with SEN at 0.3% (10 pupils) and 0.1% (3 pupils), respectively, compared to 0.2% and 0.6% nationally. The Harrow and National SEN figures may differ greatly, but they are broadly in-line with the proportion of ethnicities of the whole pupil population.

Pupils with statements/EHC plans

In 2021, the highest proportion of pupils with a statement/EHC plan are of Any Other Asian Background (18.7% - 238 pupils), followed by 18.1% (230 pupils) of Indian ethnic origin, compared to 1.8% and 2.1% nationally. Pupils with the ethnicities Traveller of Irish Heritage and Gypsy/ Roma make up the lowest proportion of Pupils with SEN at 0.3% (4 pupils) and 0% (0 pupils), respectively, compared to 0.1% and 0.4% nationally.

4.3 Pupils with SEN by Ethnicity and Primary Need

Pupils on SEN support

A higher proportion of pupils on SEN support of the following ethnic groups have the primary need Speech, Language & Communication Needs (SLCN): Any Other White Background (42.0%, nationally 34.0%), Any Other Asian Background (42.8%, nationally 41.9%), Indian (46.1%, nationally 38.4%) and White British (20.9%, nationally 20.8%), Harrow's proportions are higher than the England⁴³ averages. The second most common primary need for pupils on SEN support for the following ethnic groups is Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD): Any Other White Background (16.7%, nationally 20.8%), Any Other Asian Background (23.5%, nationally 19.9%), and Indian (13.8%, nationally 22.0%). The second most common primary need for pupils on SEN support of White British ethnic background is Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH), with 20.4% pupils in comparison to 20.4% nationally (see Appendix A4 and A5 for details).

Pupils with statements/EHC plans

A higher proportion of pupils with an EHC plan of the following ethnic groups have the primary need Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) - White British (29.8%, nationally 28.5%), Any other White background (26.5%, nationally 34.8%) and Indian (29.1%, nationally 36.9%). The second most common primary need for pupils with an EHC plan for the following ethnic groups is Speech, Language & Communication Needs (SLCN): White British (24.2%, nationally 15.3%), Any other White background (22.1%, nationally 21.0%) and Indian (25.2%, nationally 20.2%).

Pupils with an EHC plan of the ethnic group Any other Asian background (26.9%, nationally 21.4%) are more likely to have Speech, Language & Communication Needs (SLCN) as the most common primary need. The second most common primary need for pupils with an EHC plan of Any other Asian background (23.5%, nationally 35.5%) ethnic groups is Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD). 5. First Language

Chapter 5 at a glance...

- There is a lower number of pupils with SEN Support whose first language is known or believed to be English in comparison to those whose first language is known or believed to be other than English. The proportion is almost 2:3.
- The number of pupils with an EHC plan whose first language is known or believed to be English is slightly lower than those whose first language is known or believed to be other than English.
- The highest proportion of pupils on SEN Support whose first language is known or believed to be English have Speech, Language and Communications Needs as their primary need.
- The highest proportion of pupils on SEN Support whose first language is known or believed to be other than English have Speech, Language and Communications Needs as their primary need.
- The highest proportion of pupils with an EHC plan whose first language is known or believed to be English have Autistic Spectrum Disorder as their primary need.
- The highest proportion of pupils with an EHC plan whose first language is known or believed to be other than English have Autistic Spectrum Disorder as their primary need.

5.1 Pupils with SEN by First Language and Provision

In 2021, the proportion of pupils across Harrow's schools with special educational needs and identified as stating English or Other than English as a first language is very different to the national picture. 55.6% of Harrow's pupils with SEN stated a first language known or believed to be other than English, this is significantly higher than 15.7% of pupils with SEN nationally.

When we compare Harrow figures to the national figures, related to First Language, we need to take in consideration the dissimilarity of the Harrow to the national population. The vast majority of the national population state English as its first language whereas the vast majority of Harrow population states Other than English.


As can be seen in Table 27 below, 56.3% of Harrow's pupils on SEN support stated a first language known or believed to be other than English, this is significantly higher than 15.7% of SEN support pupils nationally. Of Harrow's pupils with EHC plans, 53.9% stated a first language known or believed to be other than English, this is significantly higher than 15.5% nationally.

5.2 Pupils with SEN by First Language and Primary Need

Pupils on SEN support

Across Harrow's schools, the proportion of pupils on SEN support stating Other than English as their first language by primary need is vastly different to the national average. A significant number of pupils with SEN support with the following primary needs state other than English as their first language: Speech, Language and Communication Needs (847, 66.5%), Moderate Learning Difficulty (390, 58.2%) or Visual Impairment (24, 64.9%). The proportion of these pupils is higher than the national average, see Table 28 for details.

In addition, the proportion of pupils on SEN support stating English as their first language by primary need is vastly different to the national average. A significant number of pupils with Social, Emotional and Mental Health (306, 57.2%), Specific Learning Difficulty (180, 62.7%) or Autistic Spectrum Disorder (92, 61.3%) state English as their first language.

Pupils with statements/EHC plans

The proportion of pupils in 2021 with EHC plans and with other than English as a first language by primary need is quite different to the national average. 51.7% (179) of pupils with Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) stated other than English as their first language, compared to 16.7% nationally. 57.2% (175) of pupils with Speech, Language and Communications Need as a primary need, stated other than English as a first language, compared to 20.0% nationally. 57.7% (105) of pupils with Severe Learning Difficulty as a primary need, stated other than English as a first language, compared to 18.7% nationally.

A majority of pupils with Social Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH), Multi-Sensory Impairment (MSI), and Specific Learning Difficulty (SPLD) had English as their first language. 80% of pupils with MSI (4 pupils) and over 60% of pupils with SEMH (47 – 69.1%) and SPLD (26 – 65.0%) have English as their first language, this is lower than the national average.

6. Pupil Residency

Chapter 6 at a glance...

- > The proportion of pupils with a SEN in Harrow's schools residing outside of Harrow increased since 2020. Most of the pupils residing outside of Harrow live in Brent.
- > The proportion of pupils on SEN Support in Harrow's schools residing outside of Harrow increased since 2020. Most of the pupils residing outside of Harrow live in Brent.
- > The proportion of pupils with a statement or EHC Plan residing outside of Harrow has increased since 2020. Most of the pupils residing outside of Harrow live in Brent.

6.1 Out of Borough: Pupils with SEN

Of Harrow's pupils with SEN, the number that reside and attend school in Harrow has increased over the last three years from 4,175 (87.5%) in 2019 to 4,243 (87.6%) in 2021. For children with a SEN attending Harrow's schools⁴⁷ but residing outside of Harrow, the number fluctuated from 595 (12.5%) in 2019 to 550 (11.5%) in 2020 and then to 598 (12.4%) in 2021.

In 2021, the proportion of Harrow's school's pupils with a SEN residing in boroughs outside of Harrow is as follows: Brent (4.3% - 209), Ealing (2.7% - 131), Hillingdon (1.9% - 93), Barnet (1.2% - 59) and Watford (0.4% - 17). Table 41 below includes 'All other boroughs' this is the sum of pupils residing in boroughs other than those listed above.

Of Harrow's school's out of borough resident pupils with a SEN the highest proportion reside in Brent, with pupil numbers fluctuating from 207 (4.3%) in 2019 to 192 (4.0%) in 2020 and then to 209 (4.3%) in 2021. The number of pupils with a SEN resident in Ealing fluctuated from 125 (2.6%) in 2019 to 131 (2.7%) in 2021. See Table 41 below for details.

6.2 Out of Borough: Pupils on SEN Support

The number of pupils on SEN support residing in Harrow and attending Harrow's schools⁴⁹ has dropped slightly from 3,157 (86.5%) in 2019 to 3,101 (86.9%) in 2021. SEN support pupils residing in Harrow's neighbouring boroughs have fluctuated over this period, from 494 (13.5%) in 2019 to 434 (12.1%) in 2020 and then to 467 (13.1%) in 2021.

In 2021, the proportion of Harrow's schools' pupils with SEN on Support residing in boroughs outside of Harrow was as follows: Brent (4.4% - 157 pupils), Ealing (3.3% - 118 pupils), Hillingdon (1.9% - 68 pupils), Barnet (1.4% - 49 pupils) and Watford (0.3% - 12 pupils). Table 42 below includes 'All other boroughs' this is the sum of pupils residing in boroughs other than those listed above.

6.3 Out of Borough: Pupils with Statements/EHC Plans

The number of pupils with a statement/EHC plan residing in Harrow and attending Harrow's schools⁵¹ has increased from 1,018 (91.0%) in 2019 to 1,142 (89.7%) in 2021. The number of pupils with a statement/EHC plan residing in Harrow's neighbouring boroughs has also increased over the last three years, from 101 (9.0%) in 2019 to 131 (10.3%) in 2021.

In 2021, the proportion of Harrow's schools' pupils with an EHC plan residing in boroughs outside of Harrow is as follows: Brent (4.1% - 52 pupils), Hillingdon (2.0% - 25 pupils), Ealing (1.0% - 13 pupils), Barnet (0.8% - 10 pupils), and Watford (0.4% - 5 pupils). Table 43 below includes 'All other boroughs' this is the sum of pupils residing in boroughs other than those listed above.

Of Harrow's schools out of borough resident pupils with an EHC plan the highest proportion reside in Brent, with pupil numbers rising from 44 (3.9%) in 2019 to 52 (4.1%) in 2021. The number of pupils with an EHC plan resident in Hillingdon increased from 20 (1.8%) in 2019 to 25 (2.0%) in 2021. See Table 43 below for details.

- **Permanent exclusion** When a pupil is not allowed to attend school or go on to school premises permanently due to a series of extreme offences or breaches of the school behavior policy (when a wide range of strategies have been tried and failed).
- Fixed period exclusion When a pupil is temporarily removed from school due to breaches
 of the school behaviour policy. They can only be removed for up to forty-five school days in
 one school year, even if they've changed school.

Pupils with SEN by Permanent Exclusions and Type of School 8.1

The analysis of the two distinct periods of 2016-17 to 2018-19 needs to be considered separately, as they are not comparable due to the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on school closures.

All state-funded schools

The number of permanent exclusions of pupils with SEN in Harrow's schools⁶¹ fluctuated from 24 permanent exclusions (0.52%) in 2016-17 to 39 exclusions (0.84%) in 2017-18 and to 20 exclusions (0.42%) in 2018-19. The number of permanent exclusions was 15 (0.31%) in 2019-20 and 7 (0.14%) in 2020-21. Harrow's overall trend is parallel to the national.

The number of permanent exclusions of pupils on SEN support has also fluctuated from 19 (0.53%) in 2016-17 to 36 (1.00%) in 2017-18 and to 16 (0.44%) in 2018-19. The number of permanent exclusions was 14 (0.39%) in 2019-20 and 5 (0.14%) in 2020-21.

For pupils with a statement or an EHC plan, the number of exclusions in Harrow's schools has fluctuated from 5 (0.49%) exclusions in 2016-17, to 3 (0.28%) exclusions in 2017-18 and to 4 (0.36%) exclusions in 2018-19, whereas the national rate dropped from 0.16% in 2016-17 to 0.15% in 2018-19. The number of permanent exclusions in Harrow was 1 (0.08%) in 2019-20 and 2 (0.16%) in 2020-21.

State-funded primary schools

The number of permanent exclusions of pupils with SEN at Harrow's primary schools fluctuated from 3 (0.12%) in 2016-17 to 4 (0.16%) in 2017-18 and then to 2 (0.07%) exclusions in 2018-19. The number of permanent exclusions was 2 (0.07%) in 2019-20 and 0 in 2020-21 – see Table 34 below.

For pupils on SEN support, the numbers of permanent exclusions have been very low over the last five years, fluctuating from 2 exclusions (0.09%) in 2016-17 to 3 exclusions (0.14%) in 2017-18 and then to 2 (0.09%) exclusions in 2018-19. The number of permanent exclusions was 2 (0.09%) in 2019-20 and 0 in 2020-21.

In 2018-19 there were not any permanent exclusions for pupils with a statement/EHC plan in primary schools, this figure has dropped from 1 (0.30%) in 2016-17. There were not any permanent exclusions in Harrow in 2019-20 and 2020-21.

State-funded secondary schools

The number of permanent exclusions in Harrow's high schools of pupils with SEN fluctuated from 22 exclusions (1.33%) in 2016-17, to a high of 34 exclusions (2.04%) in 2017-18 and then dropped to 16 (0.98%) exclusions in 2018-19. The number of permanent exclusions was 13 (0.82%) in 2019-20 and 7 (0.41%) in 2020-21 – see Table 35 below.

For pupils on SEN support, the fluctuations in the number and proportion of permanent exclusions in secondary schools runs parallel to the total SEN population in Harrow. The number of exclusions fluctuated from 18 (1.30%) in 2016-17 to 33 exclusions (2.34%) in 2017-18 and then to 14 (1.01%) exclusions in 2018-19. The number of permanent exclusions was 12 (0.93%) in 2019-20 and 5 (0.36%) in 2020-21.

8.2 Pupils with SEN by Fixed-Term Exclusions and Type of School

All state-funded schools

The proportion of fixed-term exclusions are significantly lower in Harrow's schools than in the statistical neighbours and in England. The number of fixed-term exclusions for pupils with SEN across Harrow's schools⁷⁷ have significantly dropped from 340 exclusions (7.34%) in 2016-17 and 346 exclusions (7.42%) in 2017-18 to 306 (6.42%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed-term exclusions was 213 (4.46%) in 2019-20 and 134 (2.77%) in 2020-21, as can be seen in Table 37 below.

For pupils on SEN support, the number and proportion of fixed-term exclusions fluctuated from 253 (7.03%) in 2016-17 to 284 (7.91%) in 2017-18 and then to 211 (5.78%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed-term exclusions was 157 (4.38%) in 2019-20 and 92 (2.58%) in 2020-21. Harrow's rate is significantly lower than the statistical neighbour and national averages of each year.

For pupils with a statement or EHC plan, the number of fixed-term exclusions has fluctuated from 87 (8.45%) in 2016-17 to 62 (5.77%) in 2017-18 and then to 95 (8.49%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed-term exclusions was 56 (4.71%) in 2019-20 and 42 (3.30%) in 2020-21. The proportion of Harrow's pupils is lower than in statistical neighbours and nationally each year.

State-funded primary schools

The number of fixed term exclusions given to primary school pupils with a SEN fluctuated from 76 (3.00%) in 2016-17 to 58 (2.26%) in 2017-18 and then to 97 (3.63%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed term exclusions was 65 (2.38%) in 2019-20 and 41 (1.54%) in 2020-21. However, the proportion of fixed-term exclusions in Harrow's statistical neighbours continued to increase over the last few years, but dropped slightly in England in 2018-19, as can be seen in Table 38 below.

For pupils on SEN support, the number and proportion of fixed-term exclusions fluctuated from 52 (2.35%) in 2015-16 to 46 (2.11%) in 2017-18 and then to 55 (2.43%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed term exclusions was 49 (2.14%) in 2019-20 and 24 (1.11%) in 2020-21. Harrow's rates are significantly lower than the statistical neighbours and national averages each year.

For pupils with a statement or EHC plan, the number of fixed-term exclusions fluctuated from 24 exclusions (7.32%) in 2016-17, to 12 (3.23%) in 2017-18 and then to 42 (10.27%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed term exclusions was 16 (3.67%) in 2019-20 and 17 (3.48%) in 2020-21. Harrow's proportion of pupils remains significantly lower than in England each year. The proportion of fixed-term exclusions of statistical neighbours (6.88% in 2018-19) was below Harrow's rate (10.27%) only in 2018-19 (see Table 38).

State-funded secondary schools

The number of fixed term exclusions in Harrow's secondary schools of pupils with SEN fluctuated from 263 exclusions (15.92%) in 2016-17 to a high of 280 (16.79%) in 2017-18 and then to a low of 198 exclusions (12.10%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed term exclusions was 141 (8.93%) in 2019-20 and 93 (5.46%) in 2020-21. Harrow's numbers are significantly lower than the statistical neighbours and national averages in each year.

For pupils on SEN support, the number and proportion of fixed-term exclusions at secondary schools fluctuated from 201 (14.47%) in 2016-17 to a high of 238 (16.87%) in 2017-18, then to a low of 156 (11.28%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed term exclusions was 108 (8.38%) in 2019-20 and 68 (4.86%) in 2020-21. Harrow's numbers are significantly lower than the statistical neighbours and national averages in each year.

The number of exclusions given to pupils with a statement or EHC plan dropped from 62 (23.57%) in 2016-17 to 42 (16.60%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed term exclusions was 33 (11.38%) in 2019-20 and 25 (8.17%) in 2020-21. Fixed-term exclusions at Harrow's special schools for pupils with a SEN have remained very low over the last 5 years. None of the very small number of pupils on SEN support at Harrow's special schools received an exclusion. The national picture reflects very high rates for small number of pupils on SEN support - from 33.30% (805 pupils) in 2016-17 to 31.13% (627 pupils) in 2018-19.

For Harrow's pupils with a statement or EHC plan, the number of exclusions increased from 1 (0.23%) in 2016-17 to 11 (2.41%) in 2018-19. The number of fixed term exclusions was 7 (1.51%) in 2019-20 and 0 in 2020-21. Harrow's numbers are significantly lower than the statistical neighbours and national averages in each academic year (see table 40 below).

9. Early Years Foundation Stage Attainment


- The proportion of pupils with SEN attaining a GLD increased each year from 2013 to 2016, dropped in 2017, increased in 2018 and remained steady in 2019. Harrow's figure is higher than national but lower than in statistical neighbours.
- The proportion of pupils with SEN attaining a ELG increased each year from 2013 to 2016, dropped in 2017, increased in 2018 and remained steady in 2019. Harrow's figure is higher than national but lower than in statistical neighbours.
- > The Average Point Score of pupils with SEN fluctuated between 2013 and 2019. Harrow's result was higher than the national average only in 2015 and 2016.
- In 2019, pupils with SEN in Harrow with Multi-Sensory Impairment (MSI) or Visual Impairment (VI) as their primary need have the highest result in achieving a GLD, while in England the pupils with Visual Impairment achieved the highest result.
- The proportion of pupils on SEN Support attaining a GLD increased each year from 2013 to 2016, dropped in 2017, increased in 2018 and remained steady in 2019.
- The proportion of pupils on SEN Support attaining the ELG increased each year from 2013 to 2016, dropped in 2017, increased in 2018 and remained steady in 2019.
- > The Average Point Score of pupils on SEN Support fluctuated from 2013 to 2019. Harrow's result was higher than the national average only in 2015 and 2016.
- In 2019, pupils on SEN Support in Harrow in 2019 with Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) as their primary need have the highest GLD result.
- > The proportion of pupils with a Statement/ EHCP attaining a GLD fluctuated since 2013 increasing to a 7-year high in 2019. Harrow's outcome in 2019 is higher than national.
- > The proportion of pupils with a Statement/ EHCP attaining the ELG fluctuated since 2013 increasing to a 7-year high in 2019. Harrow's outcome in 2019 is higher than national.
- > The Average Point Score of pupils with a Statement/ EHCP fluctuated since 2013.
- Only pupils with a Statement/ EHCP with the primary needs SLCN, ASD, MSI, SPLD and VI attained a GLD in 2019.
- In 2019, the GLD and ELG GAP between pupils with SEN and pupils with no SEN in Harrow remained steady and is slightly wider than in England due to the high achievement results of the pupils with No SEN. The APS gap between pupils with SEN and pupils with no SEN in Harrow has narrowed in 2019 and is narrower than the national APS gap.

In 2013, the Early Years Foundation Stage Profile (EYFSP⁹⁴) was introduced to assess a child's progress at the end of the EYFS. This profile requires teachers to make a fair judgement of whether children are emerging, expected or exceeding against seventeen early learning goals (ELGs). Children are assigned:

- A good level of development⁹⁵ (GLD) if they reach the expected standard in the ELGs in the prime areas of learning.
- An average point score (APS) which takes into account performance across all 17 ELGs and is broke up by: 1 point for emerging, 2 for expected and 3 for exceeding. The sum is then taken for all pupils with that characteristic and the mean given.

9.1 EYFS Attainment of Pupils with SEN – 2013 to 2019

Overall, the proportion of pupils with a SEN attaining a GLD has increased each year from 13% in 2013 to 27% in 2018 and 2019, this increase is in-line with the Statistical Neighbours and above the national results, as can be seen in Table 44 below. The percentage of pupils with a SEN reaching the expected standard across all seventeen ELGs increased from 10% in 2013 to 26% in 2018 and 2019, this increase is above the increases in the statistical Neighbours and nationally. Harrow's pupils with a SEN average point score (APS) has remained in-line with the statistical neighbours and England APS over the period 2013-2019.



9.2 Pupils with SEN by GLD and Primary Need – 2019

As can be seen in Table 45 below, the majority of pupils Harrow's schools in 2019 had the primary need Speech, Language and Communication Needs (182 pupils) and 29.7% (54 pupils) of these pupils attained a GLD, this is in-line with 29% nationally. Of the 31 pupils with the primary need Autistic Spectrum Disorder, 3 (9.7%) pupils attained a GLD and of the 14 pupils with the need Social, Emotional and Mental Health, 35.7% (5 pupils) attained a GLD. In England, 12% and 27% respectively attained a GLD.

9.3 Pupils on SEN Support by Attainment – 2013 to 2019

Since 2013, the proportion of pupils on SEN support or without a statement attaining a GLD has increased, rising from 14% in 2013 to 32% in 2018 and 2019, Harrow's increase is in-line with that of the statistical neighbours and above the national results over the same period. The percentage of pupils on SEN support reaching the expected standard across all seventeen ELGs in Harrow increased each year from 11% in 2013 to 31% in 2018 and 2019, which is above both the statistical neighbours and national results over the same period. The average point score for pupils on SEN support was 25.5 in 2013, and whilst there has been some fluctuation over the period covered in the table below, the score increased to 26.5 in 2019, which is just below the statistical neighbours and in-line with England.



9.4 Pupils on SEN Support by GLD and Primary Need – 2019

In 2019, 164 pupils of Harrow's pupils on SEN support had the primary need Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN), of which 52 (31.7%) attained a GLD, 12 had Social Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) of which 5 (41.7%) pupils attained a GLD, and 12 had SEN support but no specialist assessment of type of need (NSA) of which 2 (16.7%) attained a GLD.

9.5 Pupils with Statements/EHC Plans by Attainment – 2013 to 2019

The number of pupils with a statement/EHC plan achieving a GLD has fluctuated between 2013 and 2019 from 3 (6%) of 51 pupils in 2014 to 6 (9%) of 66 pupils in 2019. Whilst Harrow's numbers are very low it should be noted that statistical neighbours and national percentages over these years are even lower (with the exception of 2017 and 2018). A similar number of pupils have reached the expected standard in all ELGs.

Harrow's pupils with a statement/EHC plan average point score (APS) dropped from 21.1 in 2013 to 19.5 in 2018 and then increased to 20.6 in 2019. Harrow's scores have been in-line with the statistical neighbours and national picture, without the increase in 2019, see Table 47 below.



9.6 Pupils with a Statement/EHC Plan by GLD and Primary Need – 2019

Only 6 (9%) pupils with statements/EHC plans attained a GLD in 2019. These 6 pupils had the following primary needs: Speech, Language and Communications Needs – SLCN (2 pupil), Autistic Spectrum Disorder - ASD (1 pupil), Specific Learning Difficulty – SPLD (1 pupil), Multi-Sensory Impairment - MSI (1 pupil) and Visual Impairment - VI (1 pupil). Of the pupils with a statement/EHC plan with the primary needs Severe Learning Difficulty (SLD), Profound & Multiple Learning Difficulty (PMLD), Moderate Learning Difficulty (MLD), Hearing Impairment (HI), Physical Disability (PD) or Other Difficulty/Disability (OTH) none were recorded as attaining a GLD.

9.7 EYFS Headline measures SEN Pupils GAP Analysis

This section presents the gap analysis of the EYFS headline measures between pupils with SEN and pupils without SEN.

Good Level of Development (GLD)

In 2013, 13% of Harrow's pupils with SEN achieved a Good Level of Development (GLD) in comparison to 48% of pupils with no SEN achieving a GLD, resulting in a 35% gap, which is narrower than the 41% gap of the statistical neighbours and nationally. In 2019, 27% of Harrow's pupils with SEN achieved a GLD, in comparison to 80% of pupils with no SEN achieving a GLD, resulting in a 53% gap, which is wider than both the statistical neighbour and national gaps of 52%.

The gap between the SEN and no SEN groups in Harrow widened from 35% in 2013 to 57% in 2017 but narrowed slightly to 53% in 2018 and 2019. The gap of the statistical neighbours increased from 41% in 2013 to 52% in 2019 and nationally it widened from 41% in 2013 to 52% in 2019.

Since 2013, the attainment results of both the SEN and no SEN groups have increased in Harrow, statistical neighbours and England. Harrow's pupils with no SEN, GLD result increased by 32%, from 48% in 2013 to 80% in 2019. This group's result increased by 25% in statistical neighbours and 21% in England. The GLD results of the pupils with SEN only increased by 14%, 13% and 10% respectively.

The high results of the pupils with no SEN has caused for the gap to widen between the two groups.

Early Learning Goals (ELG)

The ELG results of the pupils with SEN have increased, from 2013 to 2019, in Harrow from 10% to 26%, for the statistical neighbours from 15% to 26% and nationally from 13% to 24%, as can be seen in the table below. This increase is in-line with the improvement of the ELG results of pupils with no SEN over the same period, in Harrow from 44% to 79%, for the statistical neighbours from 53% to 79% and nationally from 53% to 76%.

The increase of the ELG results has resulted in a widening gap between the two groups in Harrow, the statistical neighbours and nationally, between 2013 and 2019, from 34% to 53% in Harrow, from 38% to 53% for the statistical neighbours and 40% to 52% in England.

Average Point Score (APS)

The APS of pupils with SEN have remained quite consistent over the 2013 to 2019 period, for Harrow (25 in 2013 to 25.2 in 2019), the statistical neighbours (26 in 2013 to 25.5) and nationally (25.6 in 2013 to 25.4), as can be seen in the table below.

The results of the group of pupils with no SEN increased from 2013 to 2019, from 33 to 35.1 in Harrow, 33.8 to 36.3 in the statistical neighbours and 33.7 to 35.6 nationally.

The gap between these two groups in 2013 in Harrow, for the statistical neighbours and in England was 8.0, 7.8 and 8.1 respectively. The gap between these two groups in 2019 in Harrow, for the statistical neighbours and in England was 9.9, 10.8 and 10.2 respectively.

The increase of the results of the pupils with no SEN has caused the gap to widen. In 2019, the slight drop of the APS of the pupils with No SEN in Harrow has caused for the gap to narrow since the previous academic year. The gap of the APS between these two population groups is narrower in Harrow than in statistical neighbours and England.

10. Phonics Year 1 Attainment

Chapter 10 at a glance...

- The percentage of pupils with SEN in Harrow meeting the expected standard in Year 1 Phonics has fluctuated between 2016 and 2019, but overall increasing from 53.7% in 2016 to 57.4% in 2019. Harrow's achievement percentages are higher than in statistical neighbours and England during the last four years.
- The percentage of pupils with SEN Support in Harrow meeting the expected standard in Year 1 Phonics has fluctuated between 2016 and 2019 but has increased from a 4-year low of 61.2% in 2016 to a 4-year high of 65.0% in 2019. Harrow's achievement percentages are higher than in statistical neighbours and England during the last four years.
- The percentage of pupils with SEN Statement/ EHCP in Harrow meeting the expected standard in Year 1 Phonics has fluctuated from 23.3% in 2016 to 31.0% in 2018 and then to 24.0% in 2019. Harrow's achievement percentages are higher than England but lower than in statistical neighbours in 2019.
- Harrow's schools' pupils with SEN, with Hearing Impairment (HI) as their primary need have the highest result in meeting the expected standard in Year 1 Phonics in 2019 (over 5 pupils). In England the highest result was achieved by pupils with Visual Impairment in meeting the expected standard in Year 1 Phonics in 2019.
- The attainment GAP between pupils with SEN and pupils with no SEN in Harrow has become narrower in 2019 (from 2018) in meeting the expected standard in Year 1 Phonics. In England the gap has slightly widened. In 2019 the attainment GAP in Harrow is narrower than in statistical neighbours and England due to the higher results of the pupils on SEN support.

10.1 Pupils with SEN meeting the Expected Standard in Year 1 Phonics – 2016-19

Overall, the proportion of pupils with SEN meeting the Expected Standard in year 1 Phonics increased from a 4-year low of 53.7% in 2016 to 57.4% in 2019, compared to the statistical neighbours whose results continued to increase over this period from 53.7% to 57.4%, and nationally they fluctuated but increased from 42.4% to 43.5% over the same period.

The percentage of pupils on SEN Support in Harrow who met the expected standard fluctuated between 2016 and 2019, but overall increased from a 4-year low of 61.2% in 2016 to a 4-year high of 65.0% in 2019. Harrow's results are higher than in statistical neighbours (from 55.9% in 2016 to 59.6% in 2019) and England (from 46.3% in 2016 to 48.0% in 2019).

The percentage of pupils with EHC plan in Harrow who met the expected standard fluctuated from 23.3% in 2016 to 31.0% in 2018 and then to 24.0% in 2019. Harrow's results are higher than both the statistical neighbours, with the exception of 25.1% in 2019 and England.



10.2 Pupils with SEN meeting the Expected Standard in in Year 1 Phonics by Primary Need – 2019

In 2019, a majority of the Year 1 Phonics pupils with SEN had the primary need Speech, Language and Communication Needs (229), and of these pupils 62% achieved meeting the expected standard (47% nationally). The second largest group of pupils with SEN had Autistic Spectrum Disorder, with 31 pupils where 48.4% met the expected standard in Year 1 Phonics (37% nationally). Moderate Learning Difficulty was the third largest group with 30 pupils where 50.0% met the expected standard in Year 1 Phonics (32% nationally).

11.3 Pupils with SEN meeting the Expected Standard in in Year 1 Phonics GAP Analysis

In 2016 the percentage of **pupils with SEN** in Harrow meeting the Expected Standard in year 1 Phonics was 53.7% while the percentage of the **pupils with no SEN** in Harrow meeting the Expected Standard in year 1 Phonics was 88.4%. The equivalent results for the statistical neighbours were 49.9% for the Pupils with SEN and 87.8% for the pupils with no SEN, and nationally they were 42.4% for the Pupils with SEN and 86.5% for the pupils with no SEN. **The gap** between these two groups in 2016 in Harrow, statistical neighbours and England was 34.7%, 37.9% and 44.1% respectively.

In 2019 the percentage of **pupils with SEN** in Harrow meeting the Expected Standard in year 1 Phonics was 57.4% while the percentage of the **pupils with no SEN** in Harrow meeting the Expected Standard in year 1 Phonics was 91.3%. The equivalent results for the statistical neighbours were 52.7% for the Pupils with SEN and 90.2% for the pupils with no SEN, and nationally they were 43.5% for the Pupils with SEN and 88.1% for the pupils with no SEN. **The gap** between these two groups in 2019 in Harrow, statistical neighbours and England was 33.9%, 37.5% and 44.6% respectively.

The GAP between pupils with SEN and pupils without SEN in Harrow fluctuated from 34.7% in 2016 to 33.7% in 2017 to 36.3% in 2018 and then to 33.9% in 2019. Similarly, in statistical neighbours the GAP fluctuated from 37.8% in 2016 to 37.7% in 2017 to 38.0% in 2018 and then to 37.5% in 2019 while nationally the GAP increased from 44.1% in 2016 to 44.6% in 2019. The GAP in harrow has remained narrower than in statistical neighbours and England during the last 4 years. Since 2016, both of the groups have raised their attainment figures in Harrow, statistical neighbours and England, the pupils with no SEN by 2.9% in Harrow, 2.4% in statistical neighbours and 1.6% in England while the pupils with SEN by 3.7%, 2.8% and 1.1% respectively. The higher rate of achievement results' increase of pupils with SEN in Harrow has caused for the gap to narrow.



11. Key Stage 1 Attainment

Chapter 11 at a glance...

- The percentage of pupils with SEN in Harrow reaching the expected standard in Reading increased from 2016 to 2018 and remained steady in 2019, whereas dropped in Writing and Maths since 2017 but remained steady in 2019 (maths). Harrow's achievement percentages are higher than England but lower than in statistical neighbours.
- The percentage of pupils with SEN Support in Harrow reaching the expected standard in Reading increased from 2016 to 2018 and remained steady in 2019, whereas dropped in Writing since 2017 and fluctuated in Maths. Harrow's achievement percentages are higher than England but lower than in statistical neighbours.

The percentage of pupils with SEN Statement/ EHCP in Harrow reaching the expected standard increased in Reading from 2016 to 2019, in Writing from 2017 to 2019 and in Maths from 2016 to 2018 but dropped in 2019. Harrow's achievement percentages are higher than in statistical neighbours and England.

- Harrow's school pupils with SEN, with Hearing Impairment as their primary need have the highest result in the expected standard in reading and maths; and pupils with Physical Disability had the highest result in writing in 2019 (over 5 pupils). In England the highest result was achieved by pupils with Hearing Impairment in writing and maths; and by those with Visual Impairment in reading and maths in 2019.
- The attainment GAP between pupils with SEN and pupils with no SEN in Harrow has narrowed in 2019 (from 2017) in Reading, has widen in 2019 (since 2017) in Writing and has fluctuated in Maths. In England the gap has slightly narrowed (same in maths since 2017). In 2019 the attainment GAP in Harrow is narrower than in England but wider than in statistical neighbours due to the higher results of the SEN groups.



The 2016 Key Stage 1 (KS1) assessments were the first to assess the new, more challenging national curriculum that was introduced in 2014. Published results no longer show levels; instead, pupils now receive their test results as a scaled score. This new framework is used to assess if a pupil has met the new, higher expected standard. As a result of these changes, figures from 2016 cannot be compared to those for earlier years.

The number of KS1 pupils with a SEN increased from 338 in 2016 to 455 in 2017 but has since dropped to 382 in 2019. This overall SEN trend runs parallel with the number of pupils on SEN support. The number of pupils with EHCP or Statement has remained steady since 2017 (see Figure 18 below).

11.1 Pupils with SEN by RWM Attainment and Provision – 2016-19

The percentage of Harrow's **pupils with SEN** reaching the expected standard in Reading increased from 31% in 2016 to 35% in 2018 and 2019. Harrow's Reading result has remained below that of the statistical neighbours but just above the national results. Harrow's Writing results for this group increased from 24% in 2016 to 27% in 2019 Harrow's Writing results are in-line with the statistical neighbours and consistently higher than the national results. Harrow's maths result overall increased from 32% in 2016 to 36% in 2019, which is below that of the statistical neighbours but above the national outcome.

The percentage of **pupils with SEN Support** in Harrow reaching the expected standard in Reading has increased from 35% in 2016 to 40% in 2018 and 2019 for Reading, fluctuated in Writing from 27% in 2016 to 33% in 2017, and to 30% in 2019 and in Maths fluctuated between 2016 and 2019, but overall increased from 37% in 2016 to 41% in 2019. Harrow's results for all three subjects are consistently higher than the national results over the three-year period, however, are lower in all three subjects when compared to the statistical neighbours, as can be seen in Table 51 below.


The percentage of **pupils with a SEN Statement/ EHC plan** in Harrow reaching the expected standard in Reading increased from 13% in both 2016 and 2017 to 17% in 2019. Harrow's 2018 and 2019 results were above the statistical neighbour and National Reading results. The percentage of pupils with a SEN Statement/ EHC plan in Harrow reaching the expected standard in Writing fluctuated between 2016 and 2019, from 12% in 2016, to 8% in 2017, and increasing to 15% in 2019, remaining above the statistical neighbours and England. The percentage of pupils with a SEN Statement/ EHC plan in Harrow reaching the expected standard in Maths increased significantly from 10% in 2016 to 21% in 2018 but dropped to 17% in 2019. Harrow's figures in 2018 and 2019 are above the statistical neighbours' averages of 14% in 2018 and 15% in 2019, and the national averages of 13% in 2018 and 14% in 2019.






11.2 Pupils with SEN by Reading, Writing and Maths Attainment and Primary Need – 2019

In 2019, a majority of the KS1 pupils with SEN had the primary need Speech, Language and Communication Needs (153), and of these pupils 42.5% achieved the expected standard in reading (32% nationally), 32.7% in writing (25% nationally) and 43.1% in maths (37% nationally). Moderate Learning Difficulty was the second largest group with 50 pupils, and their results were 22% in Reading (17% nationally), 12% Writing (10% nationally) and 20% maths (19% nationally).

11.3 Pupils with SEN KS1 Headline Measure GAP Analysis

The percentage of pupils with SEN in Harrow reaching the expected standard in reading increased from 31% in 2016 to 35% in 2019 and the percentage of pupils with No SEN reaching the expected standard increased to 85% in 2019, this narrowed the gap between pupils with SEN and no SEN from 52% in 2016 to 50% in 2019. Harrow's 2019 gap is slightly wider than that of the statistical neighbours (49%) but narrower than the national gap (53%).

Harrow's pupils with SEN results in Writing increased from 24% in 2016 to 27% in 2019. The results of the pupils with No SEN in Writing also increased from 77% in 2016 to 81% in 2019. The gap between these two groups in 2019 was 54%, which is slightly wider than that of the statistical neighbours (53%) but narrower than the national gap (56%).

Harrow's pupils with SEN results in Maths increased from 32% in 2016 to 36% in 2019, and the percentage of pupils with No SEN reaching the expected standard, increased from 83% in 2016 86% in 2019. This drop caused the gap between pupils with SEN and no SEN to narrow to 50% in 2019 from 51% in 2018. Harrow's 2019 gap is wider than that of the statistical neighbours (47%) but slightly narrower than the national gap (51%).

12. Key Stage 2 Attainment and Progress

Chapter 12 at a glance...

- The percentage of pupils with SEN in Harrow achieving the expected standard in reading, writing and maths increased significantly from 2016 to 2019 and is higher than in statistical neighbours and England.
- The percentage of pupils on SEN Support in Harrow achieving the expected standard in reading, writing and maths fluctuated between 2016 to 2018 and increased significantly in 2019. It is higher than in statistical neighbours and England.
- The percentage of pupils with a Statement/ EHC plan in Harrow achieving the expected standard in reading, writing and maths increased from 2017 to 2019 and is higher than in statistical neighbours and England.
- > By the end of Key Stage 2 (2019) the progress of children in all SEN groups in Harrow exceeds that made in statistical neighbours and England Reading, Writing and Maths.
- Pupils with SEN in Harrow in 2019 with Hearing Impairment as their primary need achieved the highest result in the expected standard in reading, writing and maths, in England pupils with Visual Impairment achieved the highest result in 2019.
- All SEN and SEN Support in Harrow increased their average scaled scores in Reading, GPS and Maths from 0 to 3 points from 2016 to 2019. All SEN groups in Harrow have higher results than in England in all three subjects from 0 to 4 points.
- Pupils of all SEN groups in Harrow between 2016-2018 have fluctuated their average progress scores in Reading, Writing and Maths whereas have increased their average progress scores to a 4-year high in 2019. Harrow's results are higher than in statistical neighbours and England in 2019.
- The attainment GAP (in expected standard in reading, writing and maths) between pupils with SEN and pupils with no SEN in Harrow has significantly dropped in 2019 due to the high results of the pupils with SEN. The attainment gap is narrower than in statistical neighbours and England.
- The attainment GAP (average scaled scores) between pupils with SEN and pupils with no SEN in Harrow dropped in English and Maths but remained steady in Writing in 2019. The attainment GAP (average scaled scores) in narrower in Harrow than in England.
- The average progress scores GAP between pupils with SEN and pupils with no SEN in Harrow has narrowed in 2019 due to the high results of the SEN groups. The average progress scores GAP in Harrow is narrower than in England.

The 2016 Key Stage 2 (KS2) assessments were the first to assess the new, more challenging national curriculum that was introduced in 2014¹⁴². This new framework is used to assess if a pupil has met the new, higher expected standard. As a result of these changes, figures from 2016 cannot be compared to those for earlier years.

The headline measures, which appeared in the performance tables in December 2016, included attainment and progress measures. These are:

- the percentage of pupils achieving the 'expected standard' in English reading, English writing and mathematics at the end of key stage 2¹⁴³.
- the pupils' average scaled score in English reading and mathematics at the end of key stage 2.
- the percentage of pupils who achieve at a higher standard in English reading, English writing and mathematics¹⁴⁴.
- the pupils' average progress in English reading, in English writing and in mathematics.



The number of KS2 Pupils with SEN has fluctuated between 2016 and 2019, overall increasing from a 4-year low of 346 in 2016 to a 4-year high of 387 in 2019. Pupils on SEN support have fluctuated over this period, from a 4-year low of 241 in 2016 to a 4-year high of 293 in 2019. However, the number of pupils with a Statement/EHC plan has overall decreased, falling from 105 in 2016 to 94 in 2019 (see Figure 19 below).

12.1 Pupils with SEN by KS2 Reading, Writing and Maths (RWM) Attainment

The percentage of **pupils with SEN** in Harrow achieving the expected standard in RWM more than doubled from 15% in 2016 to 32% in 2019. Harrow's results have been higher than both the statistical neighbours' results which rose from 17% in 2016 to 27% in 2019, and the national averages, which also increased, from 14% in 2016 to 22% in 2019.

The percentage of **pupils with SEN Support** in Harrow achieving the expected standard in RWM, also more than doubled from 17% in 2016 to 37% in 2019. Harrow's results are higher than both the statistical neighbours (19% in 2016 to 32% in 2019) and the national averages, which increased from 16% in 2016 to 25% in 2019.

The percentage of **pupils with SEN with Statement/EHCP** in Harrow achieving the expected standard in RWM increased from 11% in 2016 to 17% in 2019. Harrow's results are higher than both that statistical neighbours (9% in 2016 to 12% in 2019) and the national averages that also increased from 7% in 2016 to 9% in 2019.



The percentage of **pupils with SEN** achieving the higher standard in RWM in Harrow fluctuated between 2016 and 2019, increasing from 1% in 2016 to a 4-year high of 3% in 2019. The percentage of pupils with SEN in England achieving the higher standard in reading, writing and maths has remained steady at 1% during the last four years.

The percentage of **pupils on SEN Support** achieving the higher standard in RWM in Harrow increased from 1% in 2016, to 3% in 2019. The percentage of pupils with SEN in England achieving the higher standard in RWM increased from <1% in 2016 to 2% in 2019.

Of the 105 Harrow **pupils with a statement/EHC plan** in 2016 1% reached the higher standard in RWM and 0% achieved this standard in 2017 and 2018. However, in 2019, 1% of the 94 pupils achieved the higher standard. The national result of pupils having reached the higher standard in reading, writing and maths increased, from <1% in 2016 to 1% in 2017, 2018 and 2019.

12.2 Pupils with SEN by KS2 Reading, Writing and Maths (RWM) Attainment and Primary Need

The results of Harrow's KS2 pupils with a SEN by primary need achieving the **expected standard in RWM** is higher than the national averages in 2017, 2018 and 2019. A majority of Harrow's pupils have the primary need Speech, Language and Communications Needs and the percentage of these pupils that achieved the expected standard in RWM increased from 5% in 2017 to 24% in 2019, whilst the national result only increased from 15% in 2016 to 19% in 2019. The second most common primary need in 2019 is Moderate Learning Difficulty. The percentage of these pupils that achieved the expected standard in RWM fluctuated from 15% in 2017 to 14% in 2018 and then to 15% in 2019. The national result for the same need increased from 10% in 2017 to 11% in 2018 and 2019. See Table 56 for more details below. (Further details are available in Appendix A8 and A9).

12.3 Pupils with SEN Provision KS2 Attainment Scaled Scores

For GPS, Reading and Mathematics, KS2 test results have been reported as scaled scores, with 100 as the 'expected standard' and 110 as the 'higher standard'.

Harrow's Reading scaled score average of **pupils with SEN** increased from 97 in 2016 to 99 in 2018 and 2019, Harrow's scores were higher than nationally (96 in 2016 to 97 in 2019). Harrow's GPS scaled score average for this group increased from 99 in 2016 to 102 in 2019, whilst nationally the score only increased from 97 in 2016 to 98 in 2019. Harrow's Reading scaled score average of **pupils on SEN Support** increased from 97 in 2016 to 99 in 2017, 2018 and 2019. Harrow's GPS scaled score average for this group increased from 99 in 2016 to 102 in 2019. The national figures, which are lower than in Harrow increased from 97 in 2016 to 98 in 2016 and 2017, 2018 and 2019. Harrow's Maths scaled score average for this group increased from 97 in 2016 to 98 in 2017, 2018 and 2019. The national figures is scaled score average for this group increased from 97 in 2016 to 98 in 2017, 2018 and 2019. Harrow's Maths scaled score average for this group increased from 97 in 2016 and 2017.

Harrow's Reading scaled score average of **pupils with an EHCP** fluctuated from 98 in 2016 to 95 in 2017 and then to 98 in 2019. The national scores are lower than Harrow's, with a fluctuation nationally from 96 in 2016 and 2017 to 97 in 2018 and then to 96 in 2019. Harrow's GPS scaled score average for this group fluctuated from 99 in 2016 to 101 in 2017 and 2018 and then to 100 in 2019. Again, the national figures were lower than in Harrow, with an increase from 96 in 2016 to 97 in 2018 and 2019. Harrow's Maths scaled score average for this group increased from 99 in 2016 to 100 in 2017, 2018 and 2019. The national figures were lower than in Harrow, with a steady score of 96 over the last four years.





12.4 Pupils with SEN Provision KS2 Reading, Writing, Maths Progress

In 2016, a scaled based progress measure was introduced in each subject, Reading, Writing and Maths. There is no 'target' for the amount of progress an individual pupil is expected to make¹⁵⁶.

Harrow's **pupils on SEN Support** average progress score in reading fluctuated from -0.2 in 2016 to 0.3 in 2019, for Writing fluctuated from -1.7 in 2016 to a 4-year high of -0.4 in 2019, and for maths increased from -0.2 in 2016 to 1.3 in 2019.

Harrow's progress scores are higher than the national progress scores for pupils on SEN support in Reading and maths. However, Harrow's progress score in writing dropped below the national average in 2018 in writing (-2.4 in 2016 to -1.8 in 2018 and -1.7 in 2019) but increased in 2019 above the national average. Harrow's progress scores are higher in 2019 than in statistical neighbours in Reading (-0.2 in 2019), in Writing (-0.7) and in Maths (0.1), as can be seen in Table 58 below.



For **pupils with a statement/EHC plan**, Harrow's average progress score in Reading fluctuated from -3.6 in 2016 to a 4-year high of -2.4 in 2019, for Writing fluctuated from -4.7 in 2016 to a 4-year high of -1.8 in 2019, and in Maths fluctuated from -4.0 in 2016 to -2.0 in 2019, as can be seen in Table 59 below.



Expected Standard in RWM

The percentage of pupils with SEN in Harrow achieving the expected standard in RWM increased from 15% in 2016 to 32% in 2019. Similarly, statistical neighbours' average increased from 17% in 2016 to 27% in 2019 and nationally from 14% in 2016 to 22% in 2019.

The percentage of **pupils with no SEN** in Harrow achieving the expected standard in RWM increased from 69% in 2016 to 80% in 2018 and 2019. Similarly, the statistical neighbours' average increased from 67% in 2016 to 80% in 2019 and nationally from 62% in 2016 to 74% in 2018 and 2019.

The gap between these two groups fluctuated in Harrow between 2016 and 2019, but overall narrowed from 54% in 2016 to 48% in 2019. The gap in the statistical neighbours also fluctuated but overall widened from 50% in 2016 to 52% in 2019. Nationally the gap also fluctuated but overall widened from 48% in 2016 to 52% in 2019. In 2019, Harrow's gap between these two groups is narrower than both the statistical neighbours and England.

Higher Standard in RWM

The percentage of **pupils with SEN** in Harrow achieving the higher standard in RWM fluctuated between 2016 and 2019 from 1% in 2016 to a 4-year high of 3% in 2019. In contrast, the national average has remained steady at 1% from 2016 to 2019.

The percentage of **pupils with no SEN** in Harrow achieving the higher standard in RWM increased guite significantly from 7% in 2016 to 17% in 2019. In-line with Harrow's results, the national average increased from 6% in 2016 to 13% in 2019.

The gap between these two groups in Harrow has significantly widened, more than doubling from 6% in 2016 to 15% in 2018 and 2019, in-line with the national gap, which also more than doubled from 5% in 2016 to 11% in 2018 and 2019, as can be seen in Table 61 below.

Average Scaled Scores

The average scaled scores of Harrow **pupils with SEN** increased in all three subjects; from 97 in 2016 to 99 in 2018 and 2019 (Reading), from 99 in 2016 to 102 in 2019 (GPS) and from 99 in 2016 to 101 in 2019 (Maths). Nationally, the average scaled scores in Reading fluctuated from 96 in 2016 2019 but increased in the other two subjects from 97 in 2016 to 98 in 2018 and 2019 (GPS) and from 97 in 2016 to 98 in 2018 and 2019 (Maths).

Nationally, the average scaled scores increased in Reading from 104 in 2016 to 106 in 2018 and 2019 but fluctuated in the other two subjects from 105 in 2016 108 in 2019 (GPS) and from 104 in 2016 to 106 in 2016 to 106 in 2019 but fluctuated in the other two subjects from 105 in 2016 108 in 2019 (GPS) and from 104 in 2016 to 106 in 2018 to 106 in 2019 but fluctuated in the other two subjects from 105 in 2016 108 in 2019 (GPS) and from 104 in 2016 to 106 in 2019 in Maths.

Progress Scores

The progress scores of Harrow **pupils with SEN** have fluctuated from 2016 to 2019 in Reading and Writing, with the scores increasing from -1.3 to -0.4 and -2.7 to -0.8 respectively. The scores for Maths increased from -1.4 in 2016 to 0.5 in 2019. The national results have also fluctuated, with overall increases in all three subjects.

The progress scores of Harrow's **pupils with No SEN** have fluctuated from 2016 to 2019 in Reading and Maths, with the scores increasing from 1.2 in 2016 to 1.3 in 2019 in Reading and decreased in Maths from 2.3 in 2016 from 2.1 in 2019. The Writing score increased from 0.2 in 2016 to 0.8 in 2019. The Progress score of the pupils with no SEN nationally, remained almost the same in all four years in all subjects [Reading (0.3 increased to 0.4 in 2019), Writing (0.5) and Maths (0.3 increased to 0.4 in 2019)].

The gap between these two groups in Harrow has overall narrowed in all three subjects, from -2.5 in 2016 to -1.7 in 2019 in Reading, from -2.8 in 2016 to -1.6 in 2019 in Writing and from -3.7 in 2016 to -1.6 in 2019 in Maths. Nationally the gap between these two groups in Writing has narrowed from 3.1 in 2016 to 2.7 in 2019 but widened in Reading from 1.8 in 2016 to 1.9 in 2019 and in Maths from 1.7 in 2016 to 1.9 in 2019.


Chapter 13 at a glance...

- Pupils with SEN (SEN Support and with a Statement/ EHC plan) in Harrow have a higher average Progress 8 score compared to pupils with SEN in England but a lower average Progress 8 score when compared to statistical neighbours.
- > Pupils with SEN (SEN Support and with a Statement/ EHC plan) in Harrow have a better average Attainment 8 score compared to pupils with SEN in England.
- Pupils with SEN (SEN Support and with a Statement/ EHC plan) in Harrow have higher results in Achieving 9-5 in English & Maths (%), all EBacc subjects Entered (%) and EBacc APS performance indicators than in England.
- Progress 8 scores for children with SEN Support by the end of KS4 have exceeded SN outcomes in 2016 and 2017. In 2018 and 2019 our Progress 8 score was below SN but still better than the national averages.
- Pupils with SEN in Harrow with the primary need Visual Impairment have the highest average Progress 8 and Attainment 8 scores whereas pupils with Hearing Impairment as their primary need have the highest average Progress 8 and Attainment 8 scores in England.
- > Pupils with SEN in Harrow with the primary needs Visual Impairment, Physical Disability and Hearing impairment have a positive average Progress 8 score.
- Harrow's pupils on SEN Support with the primary need Visual Impairment, Physical Disability and Hearing impairment have the highest average Progress 8 scores.
- Pupils with a Statement/ EHC plan in Harrow with the primary need Visual Impairment and Physical Disability have the highest average Progress 8 and Attainment 8 scores.
- The performance GAP between pupils with SEN and pupils with no SEN in Harrow is wider in Progress 8, Attainment 8, Achieving 9-5 in English & Maths (%), all EBacc subjects Entered (%) and EBacc APS than in England due to the very high results of the pupils with no SEN.

Due to methodology, grade and point score differences at Key Stage 4 between 2016 and 2017, 2018 or 2019, comparisons between 2016 and other three years should not really be made and if they are the comparisons should be treated with extreme caution¹⁶⁵. As of 2016, a new KS4 accountability system was implemented. The headline accountability¹⁶⁶ measure for schools is – for the first time- a Value-Added measure, 'Progress 8'.

Progress 8 is a relative measure, which means that the overall national score remains the same between years.

In this section, we consider patterns in Progress 8 on pupils with special educational needs. 2016 is the first year in which Progress 8 scores have been published for all state-funded schools.

¹⁶⁵ Attainment 8 and Progress 8 are part of the new secondary accountability system that was implemented for all schools from 2016. Users should be cautious when comparing Attainment 8 scores between 2017 and 2016. In 2017, Attainment 8 scores were calculated using slightly different point score scales in comparison to 2016, in order to minimise change following the introduction of 9-1 reformed GCSEs. This means that Attainment 8 scores are likely to look different in 2017, as a result of changes to the methodology. In 2018, Attainment 8 had a maximum point score of 90, compared to a maximum of 87 to 2017, as a result of the phased introduction of reformed GCSEs. This difference should be taken into account when considering any change in Attainment 8 scores between 2017 and 2018. 13.1 Pupils with SEN by KS4 Attainment

Average Progress 8 Score

The average Progress 8 score for **pupils on SEN support** in Harrow fluctuated but overall dropped from -0.10 in 2016 to -0.27 in 2019. Harrow's score is lower than the statistical neighbours score of -0.10 in 2019 but higher than England's score of -0.43 in 2019.

The average Progress 8 score for **pupils with SEN EHCP/Statement** in Harrow fluctuated but overall increased from -0.84 in 2016 to -0.73 in 2019. Harrow's score is higher than the statistical neighbours score of -0.84 in 2019 and the England score of -1.17 in 2019.

The average Progress 8 score for **pupils with SEN** in Harrow fluctuated but overall dropped from -0.24 in 2016 to -0.38 in 2019. Harrow's score is lower than the statistical neighbours score of -0.29 in 2019 but higher than the England score of -0.62 in 2019, see Table 64 below.



Average Attainment 8 Score

The average Attainment 8 score for **pupils on SEN support** in Harrow fluctuated between 2016 and 2019, but overall dropped from 40.1 in 2016 to 34.4 in 2019. This is lower than statistical neighbours score of 37.3 in 2019 but higher than the England score of 32.6 in 2019.

The average Attainment 8 score for pupils with **SEN EHCP/Statement** in Harrow also fluctuated and overall dropped from 17.8 in 2016 to 17.3 in 2019. Harrow's score is higher than both the statistical neighbour and England scores of 17.0 and 13.7 in 2019 respectively.

The average Attainment 8 score for **pupils with SEN** in Harrow fluctuated over the 2016 to 2019 period but overall fell from 35.6 in 2016 to 30.2 in 2019. Harrow's score is lower than the statistical neighbours score of 31.9 in 2019 but higher than England (27.6 in 2019). See Table 65 below.



The percentage of **pupils on SEN Support** in Harrow achieving 9-5 in English and Maths fluctuated from 2017 to 2019, dropping from 18.6% in 2017 to 17.6% in 2019. Harrow's 2019 result is lower than the statistical neighbours result of 23.7% but higher than the England result of 16.8%.

The percentage of pupils with **SEN EHCP/Statement** in Harrow achieving 9-5 in English and Maths fluctuated between 2017 to 2019 but overall increased from 6.8% in 2017 to a 3-year high of 10.7% in 2019. Harrow's result is higher than both the statistical neighbours result of 9.0% and the England result of 5.5% in 2019.

Whilst the percentage of **pupils with SEN** in Harrow achieving 9-5 in English and Maths fluctuated between 2017 and 2019, the 2017 result of 15.9% in 2017 remained the same in 2019. 

E-Bacc Subject Entries

The percentage of **pupils on SEN Support** in Harrow entering in all E-bacc subjects increased from 24.2% in 2016 to 33.3% in 2019. This is higher than both the statistical neighbours (27.9% in 2019) and England (16.9% in 2019).

The percentage of **pupils with SEN EHCP/Statement** in Harrow entering in all E-bacc subjects fluctuated from 5.3% in 2016 to 13.5 in 2018 and then to 9.5% in 2019. This is higher than both the statistical neighbours (7.2% in 2019) and England (4.0% in 2019).



The E-Bacc Average Point Score for **pupils on SEN support** in Harrow increased from 2.67 in 2018 to 2.93 in 2019. This is lower than the statistical neighbour score of 3.16 in 2019 but higher than England (2.66 in 2019).

The E-Bacc Average Point Score for **pupils with SEN EHCP/Statement** in Harrow increased from 1.24 in 2018 to 1.44 in 2019. This is higher than both the statistical neighbours (1.38 in 2019) and England (1.07 in 2019).

13.2 Pupils with SEN by Attainment and Primary Need in 2019

In 2019, Specific Learning Difficulty (SPLD) and Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) are the most common primary needs for pupils with SEN.

The **average Progress 8 score** for pupils with SPLD was -0.19, almost the same as the national average (-0.18). The average Progress 8 score for pupils with SEMH was -0.70, half a grade higher than the national average at -1.19. In general, there is not a pattern detected. Harrow's average Progress 8 score is higher than the national average for most of the primary needs while lower for a few of them.

The **average Attainment 8 score** for pupils with SPLD was 28.8, lower than the national average of 34.4. The average Attainment 8 score for pupils with SEMH was 35.5, almost a whole grade higher in each one of the measure's subjects when compared to the national average at 26.2. In general, there is not a pattern detected. Harrow's average Attainment 8 score is higher than the national average for some of the primary needs while lower for some others.

Pupils with a Visual Impairment (VI) as their primary need in Harrow have achieved the highest Progress 8 and Attainment 8 scores whereas pupils with a Hearing Impairment (HI) achieve the highest Progress 8 and Attainment 8 scores nationally. See Table 69 below for more details.

The percentage of pupils with SPLD achieving **9-5 in English and Maths** in 2019 is 10.1%, which is significantly lower than England average of 18.1%. The percentage of pupils with SEMH achieving 9-5 in English and Maths in 2019 is 22.7%, which is significantly higher than England's average of 13.0%. There is not a pattern detected, with Harrow's results being higher than the national averages for some of the primary needs while lower for others, as can be seen in Table 70 below.

The percentage of pupils with SPLD **entering E-Bacc subjects** was 26.1%, higher than England (14.1%). The percentage of pupils with SEMH entering E-Bacc subjects was 25.8%, higher than England at 13.1%. In general, in almost all primary needs, Harrow's percentage of pupils entering E-Bacc subjects in Harrow was higher than the national percentages.

The **E-Bacc Average Point Score** for pupils with SPLD was 2.45, lower than the national average of 2.79. The E-Bacc Average Point Score for pupils with SEMH was 2.98, almost a whole grade higher than national at 2.13. There is not a pattern detected with Harrow's score being higher than the national average for some of the primary needs while lower for some others.

In 2019, Specific Learning Difficulty (SPLD) and Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) are the most common primary needs for pupils on SEN Support.

- The average Progress 8 scores for pupils with SPLD and SEMH were -0.05 and -0.63 respectively.
- The average Attainment 8 scores for pupils with SPLD and SEMH were 31.4 and 37.4 respectively.
- The percentages of pupils with SPLD and SEMH achieving 9-5 in English and Maths were 11.3% and 24.2% respectively.
- The percentages of pupils with SPLD and SEMH entering in all E-Bacc subjects were 29.0% and 27.4% respectively.
- The E-Bacc Average Point Scores for pupils with SPLD and SEMH were 2.68 and 3.14 respectively.

When comparing the performance of pupils on SEN Support with these two primary needs to those with other primary needs in Harrow, it seems that the pupils of these two needs underperform in most of the indicators. Further details can be found in table below.

13.4 Pupils with SEN KS4 Headline Measures GAP Analysis

As stated in the beginning of the chapter, due to grade and point score differences between the first three years (2016, 2017, 2018) of the new performance measures, every comparison should be treated with extreme caution¹⁸⁰.

In 2019, for **all pupils with SEN**, the average Progress 8 score in Harrow was -0.38, lower than the statistical neighbours score of -0.29 but higher than the national score of -0.62. The average Progress 8 score for pupils with **pupils with No SEN** in Harrow was 0.53, slightly below the statistical neighbours score of 0.55 but well above the national score of 0.08.

The average Progress 8 score gap between the two groups in Harrow is 0.91, and the gap for the statistical neighbours 0.83, while the national gap is 0.70. See Table 73 below



In 2019, the E-Bacc Average Point Score of **pupils with SEN** in Harrow was 2.56, lower than the statistical neighbours' score of 2.69 but higher than England's score of 2.24. The E-Bacc Average Point Score of **pupils with no SEN** in Harrow was 5.02, higher than the national E-Bacc APS of 4.40 but lower than the statistical neighbours' score of 5.16.

The E-Bacc Average Point Score gap between these two groups is almost the same in Harrow and statistical neighbours at 2.46 and 2.47 respectively. The E-Bacc Average Point Score gap between these two groups in Harrow (2.46) is wider than in England (2.16). See table below

14. Pupils Destination after completing KS4 in Education, Employment or Training

Chapter 14 at a glance...

- The percentage of pupils with SEN in Harrow who sustained any education or employment after completing KS4 increased from 2015/16 to 2017/18 and 2018/19. In line with Harrow's trend, the percentage increased in statistical neighbours and England.
- The percentage of pupils on SEN Support in Harrow who sustained any education or employment after completing KS4 increased from 2015/16 to 2017/18 and then dropped in 2018/19. In contrast to Harrow's trend, the statistical neighbour percentages were steady and increased in England.
- The percentage of pupils with EHCP in Harrow who sustained any education or employment after completing KS4 increased from 2015/16 to 2016/17, dropped in 2017/18 and increased in 2018/19. In contrast to Harrow's trend, the percentage KS4 dropped in 2018/19 in the statistical neighbours and in England.
- The attainment GAP between pupils with SEN and pupils with no SEN who sustained any education or employment after completing KS4 in Harrow has remained steady in 2018/19 in comparison to the previous year. In the statistical neighbours and England, the gaps narrowed. In 2018/19 the GAP in Harrow is narrower than in statistical neighbours and England due to the higher percentage of pupils with SEN who sustained any education or employment after completing KS4.

Destination measures

Destination measures show the percentage of pupils with sustained participation in education destinations including schools, further education or sixth-form colleges and higher education institutions (HEI); the percentage who went into apprenticeships; the percentage who went into employment; and those who did not have sustained participation in education or employment.

Measured period

To count as a 'sustained' destination, the young person has to be participating for 'two terms' or 'six months' the following academic year – the period considered is October to March. Young people are counted as being on an apprenticeship if they participate in relevant training for at least six consecutive months at any point in the destination year.

Education and apprenticeship destinations require activity in every month; employment destinations are allowed a pause of one month.

Calculation of sustained participation in education destinations

To be included in the measure, students have to be recorded in sustained participation in all of the first two terms of the year at one or more education destinations. This therefore encourages schools and colleges to support and prepare their students to progress to a destination that offers sustained engagement.

Sustained participation is defined to be between October 2018 and March 2019 in the 2018/19 academic year, as this addresses change at the start of the academic year, where students may switch courses or start later. It is also the measurement period that is closest to the point at which the student left their former school or college, so is the period over which the institution has most influence. Sustained participation was mainly calculated using recorded start and end dates for their participation within each of the relevant datasets.

The Statistical First Releases figures of 2018/19 were first published on.

14.1 Pupils with SEN – Destination after completing KS4: Any sustained education, employment or training

The percentage of **pupils with SEN** in Harrow who sustained any education or employment after completing KS4 increased from 91% in 2015/16 to 95% in 2017/18 and 2018/19. Harrow's percentages are higher than in statistical neighbours (from 90% in 2015/16 to 91% in 2018/19) and in England (from 89% in 2015/16 to 90% in 2017/18).

The percentage of **pupils on SEN Support** in Harrow who sustained any education or employment after completing KS4 fluctuated, increasing from 90% in 2015/16 to 93% in 2018/19. These figures are higher than in statistical neighbours (90% each year from 2015/16 to 2018/19) and England (from 88% in 2015/16 to 89% in 2018/19).

The percentage of **pupils with SEN EHCP/Statement** in Harrow who sustained any education or employment after completing KS4 fluctuated, increasing from 95% in 2015/16 to 99% in 2018/19. These figures are higher than in statistical neighbours (from 91% in 2015/16 to 92% in 2018/19) and England (from 90% in both 2015/16 and 2018/19).
