FOREWORD

am proud of everything we've managed to achieve in a small amount of time, as we continue to restore pride in Harrow.

Over the last 20 months we have delivered a number of key priorities that are helping to make Harrow a great place to live, work and visit.

I want Harrow to be a borough people feel proud to call their home – just as I do. Residents often tell me they are already seeing a positive difference in the services we provide.

Last year, we set our three key priorities for Harrow - a council that puts residents first, a borough that is clean and safe, and a place where those in need are supported.

Our flagship actions have brought tangible improvements to our borough. They include our work to repair our roads, tackle fly-tipping with use of CCTV and secure Green Flag Awards for our Parks. In the last 12 months, we've also launched a new consultation platform, strengthened our planning framework to protect our suburbs, and opened a new customer centre.

Alongside these achievements, we have also progressed our regeneration plans. Phase 1 of the regeneration of the Grange Farm estate is complete and Milton Road, the development next to the old Civic Centre, is due for completion later this year - both are 100% affordable schemes.

We've also very recently signed off a new business plan for the redevelopment of two of our key sites at Byron Quarter and Poets Corner, which will deliver around 1,250 new homes for Harrow including more and much-needed affordable and family homes.

To keep our borough clean and safe, we fulfilled our pledge to use more mobile CCTV cameras to tackle fly-tipping, and through a series of Weeks of Action, are helping to tackle anti-social behaviour and enforce standards of cleanliness in key areas.

This has been complemented by the development of a new Public Spaces Protection Order for the borough, giving us enhanced powers to tackle the neighbourhood problems you care about most.

We're really pleased to have introduced one-hour free parking, which has encouraged residents to rediscover their high streets and shop locally. And we've made these shopping areas more welcoming to visit with new hanging baskets.

A number of times recently we've come together as a community to mark important occassions, including Remembrance Sunday and His Majesty the King's Coronation. These have also been a source of much local pride.

In September we held our annual Harrow's Heroes awards, recognising the work of ordinary

members of the public who make a difference for our borough and our residents. On the theme of supporting others, we have also made a lot of progress in enhancing our social care services, with the development of Neighbourhood Resource Centres and Family Hubs that better meet the needs of the community.

I know there there is still a lot of work to be done but I am confident we are heading in the right direction. We will continue to focus on the issues that matter to our residents and we will continue to restore pride in Harrow.

Our Corporate Plan sets out our ambitions and priorities for the next two years and the key flagship actions for the next year that will deliver better outcomes for our residents, businesses and communities.

In everything we do, we will always put our residents first.

Recruit 2 graduates as part of the National Graduate Scheme for the first time



Start work to make Harrow Town Centre better connected, more accessible and sustainable

Double the number of electric vehicle charging points for the second year



Launch a Pothole Squad, using new technology to find and fix potholes quickly and cheaply



Create a culture of recycling with at least 7 recycling events in schools and 3 TRAID events.



Identify 3 locations for new habitat banks and enhance biodiversity in Harrow's parks and open spaces



Make council homes and buildings more sustainable and cheaper to run



Reduce antisocial behaviour in 4 hot spots with a series of days and nights of action



Create a task force to keep our streets clean and safe
